### University Will Play Willamette Tossers Tonight

UNIVERSITY OF OREGON, Eugene, Jan. 6 (Special)—The Oregon basketball team will open its home season here tonight against the Willamette university quintet of Salem in the first of a two-game series, the second tilt of which will be played on Saturday. So for this year the Webfoots have been undefeated. Three games have been played, all of them decided by decisive scores.

The Webfoot first squad, preparing for the Willamette games, numbers 14 players. Of these only four—Scott Milligan and Gordon Ebbens—are letter-men. Eight, however, have had previous varsity experience. They are: Ike Kops, guard and forward; Don McCord, forward; Ray Edwards, center; Howard Ebbert, center; Bob Reynolds, center; Joe Hally, guard; Mervin Chastain, guard; and Howard Hummel, guard. All of these men with the exception of Kops, Hummel and Edwards are Eugene residents. Kops was a member of the Franklin high team of Portland which increased its national championships at Chicago several years ago and Edwards transferred from Milton, Vermont to come to Grants. New men out are Jack Dowsett, forward; Chastain, head clerk; forward; Robinson and Reineth, forwards; Milton.

### Single Bounce In Basketball Favored

INDIANA, Ill., Jan. 6 (AP)—Favorable opinion of the dribble in favor of a single bounce in basketball is advanced by Coach Craig Huby of the University of Illinois.

He favors the change for the general welfare of the game. "My belief in the necessity of a change is based on the situation in Illinois basketball, where the stalling attack is carried to an excess," he said. "On small high school floors the five-man defense proves so strong that it causes stalling."

NEW YORK, Jan. 6 (AP)—Called upon in the defense of his newly acquired world's light heavyweight championship in Madison Square Garden tonight, Tommy Loughran of Philadelphia, will be forced to expelise his highly rated ring generalship to the utmost against the on-rushing and hattering style of Leo Lomski, his Pacific coast challenger.

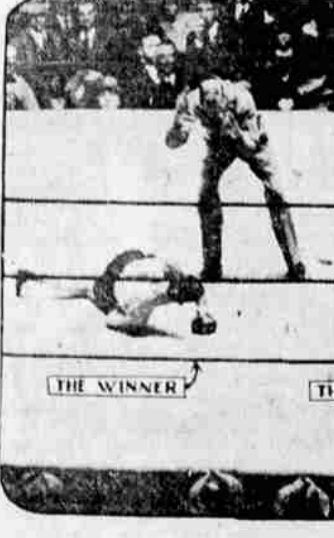
The bout of 15 rounds will be the first title affair of the new year. It will start at 10 o'clock eastern standard time.

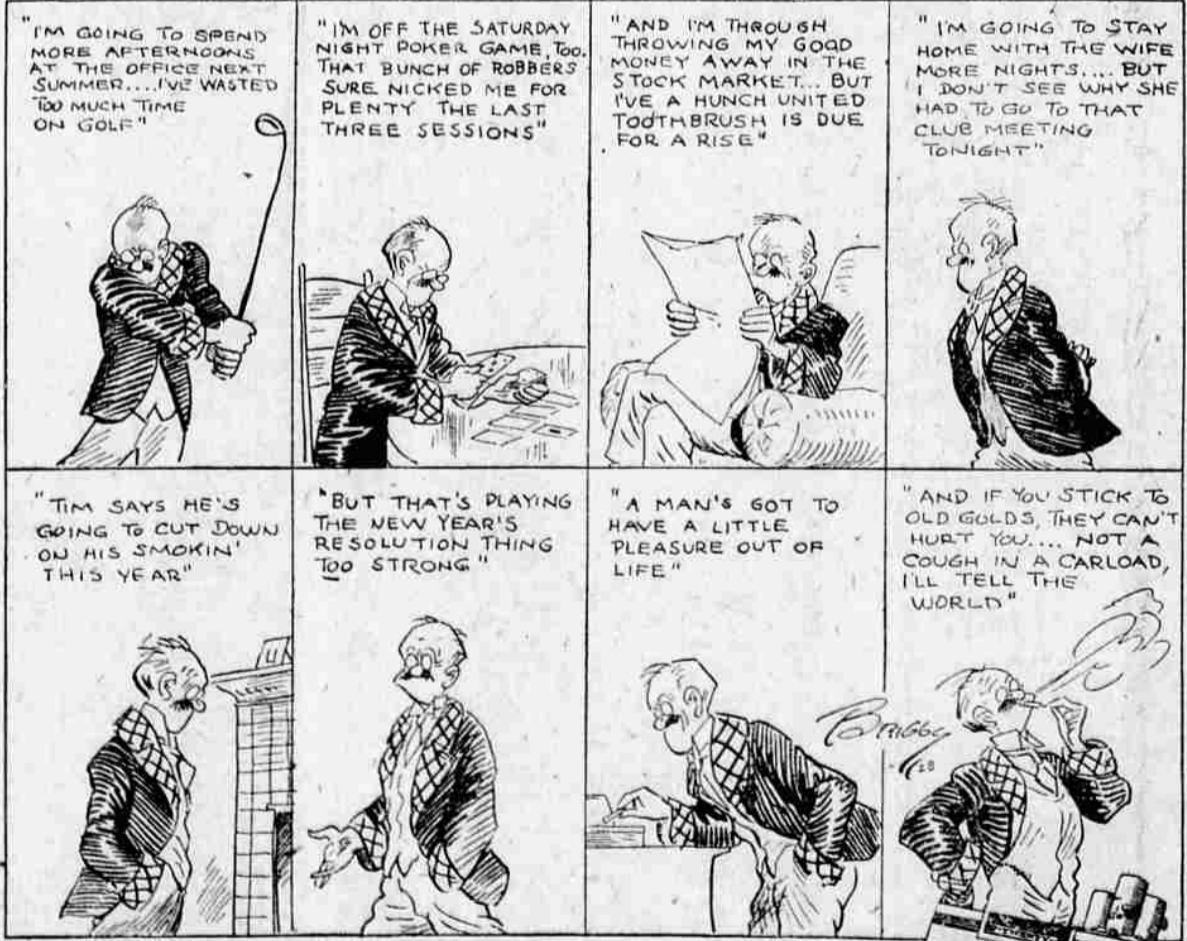
The Philadelphia Inquirer today says negotiations are being made for a bout with the champion at the Sesqui-Centennial stadium here.
