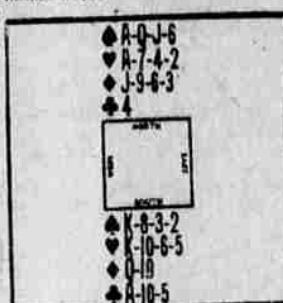
UNION (Special)—Mr. and Mrs. T. T. Cook were host and hostess Wednesday evening at their home in North Union to the members of the T. B. club.

## Bridge Pointers By Milton C. Work

Yesterday we gave the twenty-five cards of a Dealer and his partner, and asked how those two players should declare, supposing that the opponents passed whenever it was their turn. The score was stated to be love-all, and the hands were:



### THE ANSWER

South (Dealer) should bid on No Trump; he has three suits safely stopped and has a hand better than average by the difference between a King and a Jack. He has length in both Majors which will be helpful should North have a Major take-out, and he has some strength in his defenseless suit. North should bid two Spades. The overcall with two of a Major usually announces a suit of five cards or longer; but this is the exceptional type of hand which the overcall should be made with a four-card Major. The requisites for such exception are: (a) Great strength in the take-out Major, (b) one sure trick in the side hand, (c) a suit which looks dangerous for a No Trump. The North hand contains all these requisites.

South is delighted with North's Major take-out; indeed, the possibility that his No Trump would produce a Major take-out from North was one of the underlying reasons that justified it. It would be beyond the limit of folly for South to rebid the No Trump when holding such unusual assistance for North's Major suit. It will be noticed that with normal division of the adverse cards, these two hands probably will produce game 2-1-1 tricks at Spades; they are not likely to lose more than two diamonds and one heart. But at No Trump it is very doubtful that South could make game—nine tricks. It probably would depend upon whether West's original opening was a Club or some other suit. Copyright John P. Dille Co.

## FULL ACCORD ON TREATY OF ARBITRATION

PARIS, Jan. 6. (AP)—French circles believed that the Franco-American arbitration treaty with a denunciation of progressive war in its preamble can be signed very shortly.

There is full accord on the principles of the treaty between the two countries and it remains only to polish the text of the treaty so that France's league of nations and the American Monroe doctrine can be properly recognized. These points are being discussed in exchanges of cables between the two countries in adjusting them as far as possible.

## MENUS

**By Sister Mary**  
BREAKFAST — Stewed dried apricots, whole wheat cereal, cream, codfish puffs, corn bread, milk, coffee.

**LUNCHEON** — Cream of onion soup, spinach and egg salad, chocolate bread pudding, milk, tea.

**DINNER** — Pot roast of veal, baked squash, tomato jelly, salad, date and nut pudding, milk, coffee.

Carrots and potatoes are added to the pot roast about one hour before time for serving. Gravy is made in the roaster after the meat and vegetables are removed.

Chocolate bread pudding uses up stale bread to advantage.

**Chocolate Bread Pudding**  
One cup stale bread crumbs, 2 cups scalded milk, 1 square bitter chocolate, 1/2 cup sugar, 1 egg, 1 teaspoon butter, 1/2 teaspoon vanilla, few grains salt.

Pack crumbs firmly in cup to measure. Soak bread in milk for 20 minutes. Melt chocolate over hot water, add half the sugar and enough milk taken from the bread and milk to make thin enough to pour. Beat yolk of egg until thick and lemon colored. Stir into bread and milk, and add chocolate mixture, remaining sugar, nut butter, salt and vanilla. Mix thoroughly and fold in white of egg beaten until stiff and dry. Turn into a buttered pudding dish and bake 50 minutes in a slow oven. Serve warm with whipped cream flavored very slightly with peppermint. One drop of oil of peppermint will be sufficient to flavor one cup of whipped cream. Use two tablespoons powdered sugar to sweeten lightly.
