THE VERY CHRONIC APPENDIX

Member Gorgas Memorial Appendicitis, which twenty-five years ago was frequently overlooked or unrecognized even by the medical profession, is now a familiar clinical picture to the laity as well as to the doctor. The pain localized in the right lower quadrant of the abdomen, the elevation of temperature, coated tongue, nausea and vomiting, and rigidity of the abdominal wall on the affected side comprise a group of symptoms that cannot readily be mistaken for anything else.

There is a phase of the disease, however, which is not so well known and with which the public is almost totally unacquainted. It is the very chronic variety of appendicitis known clinically as the stenosing or contracting variety. It is also quite usual for the symptoms of stenosing appendicitis to be referred to some more or less remote portion of the abdomen, so that the attention of both patient and doctor will be directed away from the organ. Frequently it is the upper abdomen which seems to be the seat of the trouble.

These cases are often mistaken for indigestion or chronic gastric or duodenal ulcer, for neuritis of the stomach, for gall-bladder inflammation, or for a chronic catarrh of the large bowel or colon. The patient knows he is not ill. He has indigestion more or less marked. His tongue is dry, furrowed, and heavily coated. He suffers from occasional vague pains in the median end of the stomach. His bowels are more or less constipated, and he is the victim of varying degrees of nervous prostration. He is depressed, both physically and mentally, and is regarded frequently as a neurasthenic or hypochondriac. His hands are cold and clammy, and his blood-pressure is apt to be low.

The usual clinical history of these cases is one covering months or years without relief to the vague, though distressing, symptoms. The patient will suffer in dispositions until scientific advice is sought and a diagnosis made and proper treatment instituted. An x-ray examination after a fast-meal has been given will generally reveal the chronic trouble in the appendix. Removal of the organ will do much to restore the patient to a normal state of health.
