HEALTH

WHY DO PARENTS FREQUENTLY NEGLECT HEALTH OF THEIR CHILDREN?

It is agreed that every child has a right to demand from the state good clean school rooms with provision for constant temperature, sunlight, and good water to drink.

And by the same token each child has the right to demand of its parents a place where he can rest at night so that nature can repair his body, and that his body be made as near the average individual as it is possible in this day of enlightenment from the standpoint of preventive disease.

If every father and mother of this country would see to it that

their child had the average vision, the average hearing, the average cleanliness of skin and mouth, it would do a great deal toward lessening the prevalence of infectious and contagious diseases, and speed up the progress of their children during their school days.

Children are inclined to assume guardianship of their own bodies, especially before and after school up until bed-time; and yet every parent owes a certain responsibility to society at large to look after the physical, mental, and moral make up of his offspring.

As the rightful guardians of their children, it is the parents' duty to see that their children's bodies are clean and healthy, that their eyes and ears, nose and throat are in accordance with their inheritance and whatever assistance scientific medicine is able to give.

Children's eyes should be examined every year and glasses prescribed if there is any necessity for them. If the youngsters do not sleep well at night, if they are inclined to snore or to choke when lying on their backs, if noses are inclined to run on slight exposure to cold, if hearing is forced, and they are always saying "Huh?" to questions, an examination of ears, nose, and throat should be made by a competent physician.

The removal of bad tonsils and adenoids not only improves the breathing, and thus improves the child's sleep, but also improves the acuteness of hearing. Colds are frequently prevented by the removal of adenoids.

The mother should examine the skin at frequent intervals to see that no contagious diseases appear unrecognized and that no vermin have been picked up by child in playing with other children. The least complaint of sore throat, headache or earache should cause the mother to seek the advice of the family physician.
