Chicago Trying New Parking Law In Loop District

CHICAGO, Jan. 10 (AP)—Chicago's latest and most drastic traffic ordinance, a ban on curb parking in the congested loop district, went into effect today. The new ordinance is an experiment. If it is found effective in speeding up traffic, it will be made permanent. Special provisions have been made for trucks, taxicabs and other public conveyances so they can pick up and discharge passengers and cargoes. Two mounted policemen patrolled each block with instructions to see that no one parks and slips away. No arrests will be made during the first few days of enforcement. Cab companies have given notice to the effect that those calling a cab in the no-parking sections must be ready when the cab arrives, as it will wait only three minutes at the curb.

Sammy Baker Will Fight Negro Lad

LOS ANGELES, Jan. 10 (AP)—Coming back to the ring after several months lay off, Sammy Baker, New York welterweight contender, tonight will attempt another step along the trail leading to a match with champion Joe Dundee. The former Mitchell field non-com will take on Charles Long, negro middle weight who recently stepped to the fore at the expense of Bert Colimon, popular Whittier, Cal., Mexican, in a ten-round melee. The opinion of the average fan was that Baker despite Long's recent good work, would have little trouble winning.

Confidence Of Steamship Men Opens in Capital

WASHINGTON, Jan. 10 (AP)—Opening a conference today with representatives of American steamship owners and allied interests, Chairman O'Connor of the shipping board declared that "every one is in favor of an American merchant marine but that while we are tussling about who will hold the reins the horse is starving."

O'Connor explained that the board was compelled by law to sell government owned vessels in a way that would insure permanent operations by purchasers.

In calling attention of the 200 representatives of private steamship companies to the fact that a number of bills for establishment of a merchant marine were pending before congress, O'Connor asked the American steamship interests to express to the board their views on the various bills and suggest to congress through the board, methods by which the government might aid in the establishing of a permanent privately owned merchant marine.

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Farm Pointers

Oyster shell scale on apples may be an important pest in parts of Oregon the coming season, according to the entomology department at the experiment station. Growers who find the brown pear shaped scales on an occasional fruit will usually find the scale on the bark of the trees if they examine them closely. Sprays of lime-sulfur, 12 gallons of the concentrated solution to 100 gallons of water, applied in February is the standard control for this pest.

A farmer's time will be well spent during the rainy weather if he hauls gravel and fills up all mud holes in his roads and around watering places. Now is an easy time to determine the places that need the gravel.

Spilled clover hay and straw as well as manure may be spread on sod land that is not too soft to haul on. This is only put on land that is to be plowed next season and cropped.
