Film Vamp Uses Same System As In Earlier Days

HOLLYWOOD, CALIF. (AP)—The art of screen vamping has not changed since the popularity of Theda Bara put a new verve "to vamp" into the English language. That is the opinion of Theda Bara herself after a survey of the 1927 crop of make-believe home-wreckers. Miss Bara is more or less of a newswoman in films compared with Mary Pickford and the Gish sisters, but of vamps she can speak as a pioneer, for the word "vamp" came into general circulation as the result of her screen success as the vampire in "A Fool There Was," screened in 1915 from the stage adaptation of Kipling's famous poem.

"In all essentials," said Miss Bara, "the screen vamps of today follow the same method that made my characterizations popular. Only the incidents have altered. The hair and gowns with which the vamp heightens her lure, the way she dresses her hair, and perhaps a few other details."

"The importance of these details tends to be exaggerated when one thinks of the vamp of seven or eight years ago, the originator of this type of role went on to explain, but a few years ago regular details will distort one's judgment of the vamp of 1927.

Naturally no woman could look stylishly wicked now in a 1917 wardrobe. And a few years from now the wife who sees a 1927 model vamp on the screen will wonder how such a quaint creature could hope to wreck homes. Whoever heard of a successful home-wrecker whose wardrobe was out of date?

Film fans who remember Theda Bara only as she was in her wickedest screen moments may be surprised to learn she lives quite the opposite of a vampirish life today. In her charmingly comfortable Beverly Hills home it is hard to imagine her as the heartless strew whose devastating power over men thrilled picturegoers to the end and worried screen censors in proportion.

She might be the wife of a prosperous merchant or banker; her neighbors suggest the graceful hostess rather than the "mystery" of the party. As a matter of fact, her husband is a motion picture director—Charles Brabin.

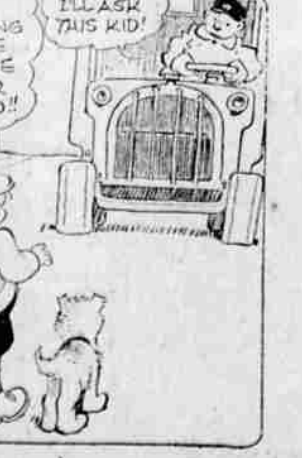

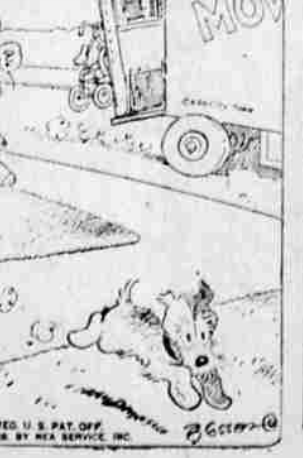
