ALL GRADE EGGS QUOTED HIGHER

Standard Extras Up a Cent and Standard Firsts Jump 2 Cents

PORTLAND, Ore., Jan. 13 (AP)—All grades of eggs are higher on the Portland exchange board today, except under and medium extras. Standard extras are 1c higher at 27c; standard firsts are up 2c at 36c, and medium firsts are up a cent at 33c.

Butter prices are firm with the quotation on extra 1/2c higher at Wednesday's price of 47c. Other grades are unchanged. The poultry market is weaker, although prices are not notably lower. Receipts during the past few days have been heavy and a large accumulation of birds has resulted. Demand is light in nearly all divisions and lower prices are probable.

Country dressed meats are firm, with the exception of hogs which are still weak. Choice light hogs were bringing around 13 1/2c early today.

Onion prices continue strong, local dealers getting from \$2 to \$2.50 for No. 1 Oregon yellow Danvers. Reports are still coming in from the Salem district that California buyers are offering good prices, from \$2.25 to \$2.40 for No. 1a. Supplies in local warehouses are fairly large, according to commission men and buyers here are loath to offer over \$2.25.

There is no change in the potato market, although movement is becoming heavier.

Spinach is exceedingly scarce in all markets on the coast and is bringing around \$4.50 a crate.

Rails Leading Price Movement In Wall Street

NEW YORK, Jan. 13 (AP)—Rais superseded the industrials as leaders of the upward price movement in today's stock market. Operators for the rise succeeded in marking up a number of industrial specialties 5 to 6 points in the early trading, but they made little headway among the standard issues.

Banks called about \$5,000,000 in loans, but there was a plentiful supply of call funds available at the renewal figure of 4 per cent. The weekly mercantile review characterized business as fair, stressing the improvement shown in some of the country's major industries.

Canadian Pacific was the leader in the railroad group, quickly moving up 5 points. Nickel Plate common recorded a similar gain and Chesapeake and Ohio, Pure Marquette, Pittsburgh and West Virginia, New York Central, Delaware and Hudson, Frisco common and Lehigh Valley moved up 2 to 4 points. Others advanced a point or two.

The closing was strong. Radio threw off restraint in the late afternoon advanced above 194 and carried with it other public utilities. Oil had one of their periodical spurts, Houston rising more than three points. American Can, Continental Can, and International Nickel also were heavily bought. The best prices of the day prevailed for U. S. Steel and General Motors, while National Surety and Nashville, Chattanooga and St. Louis advanced five and 10 points, respectively. Total sales approximated 2,000,000 shares.

WOOL REPORT

BOSTON, Jan. 13 (AP)—The Commercial Bulletin tomorrow will say: "The demand for wool continues steady and prices are slowly but surely hardening for all descriptions, both here and abroad. Stocks of wool in Boston dealers' possession Jan. 5, including tops and noils at 52,000,000 pounds were somewhat larger than expected but not materially so. Last year when there were much larger stocks at country points there were 81,000,000 pounds in Boston.

"Foreign primary markets have shown a slight rising tendency this week and an advance of fully 5 per cent is predicted for all descriptions at London on Tuesday.

"The contracting movement in the west has slowed but some wool is being taken here and there at substantially last week's prices.

"The demand for goods is reported as rather slow but the outlook is considered healthy.

"Mohair is but moderately active but firm."

Broccoli Crop Is Bumper One

ROSEBURG, Ore., Jan. 13 (AP)—Faced with prospects of an exceptionally early season and a bumper crop, Umpqua valley broccoli growers are endeavoring to devise ways to market what they expect to be one of the biggest crops ever harvested in this district. Unusually warm January weather has caused the broccoli to mature very rapidly, and it begins to appear (but some of the early strains are apt to be ready for shipment in car-load lots by the first of February, with the peak of the harvest about the first of March and at least two weeks earlier than usual. Since the first of the year Roseburg has been enjoying clear, warm weather, which has brought about exceptionally rapid development of broccoli. Growers prefer to have the crop held back, as the later the harvest the better opportunity for a good price.

Wheat Unsettled And Some Higher

CHICAGO, Jan. 13 (AP)—Opening at 3 1/2 to 3 3/4 net gain, Chicago wheat continued to mount. Corn, oats and provisions also developed strength, corn starting 1/2 to 3/4c higher and then regaining a little, but afterward rising higher than before.

Wheat closed unsettled, 1/2 @ 3/4 to 3 1/2 higher; corn unchanged to 3/4c up; oats unchanged to 3/4c advance and provisions unchanged to a rise of 1/2c.
