A. Gray Gilmore, of Oklahoma City, attorney for Welby Hunt, accused with Hickman of the murder of a California slugging, arrived here last night to take depositions for Hunt's defense.

Walsh said he obtained information he considered important to Hickman's defense on his trip to Arkansas and Oklahoma. He will leave for Los Angeles tomorrow.

LOS ANGELES, Jan. 17 (AP)—"Traces of shoes and stockings believed to be those worn by little Marian Parker at the time of her kidnaping by William Edward Hickman and missing since the recovery of her dismembered body, was obtained by the police last night.

boarded the Memphis instead of the Texas was to obviate a change at Key West which would have been necessary because the Texas is too large to enter the dock there. The trip to Havana necessitated a change of the presidential party from the Memphis to the Texas before the arrival in Havana.

As the president departed, he took with him the praise of the people and the Cuban press. During his short stay here he endeavored himself in the hearts of many Cubans and both himself and his speech received acclamation in this morning's newspapers.

**Visits Machado**

Yesterday the president spent the entire afternoon in company with President Machado, visiting Havana and its environs as well as the suburban farming districts. Within a comparatively few hours he was whisked from place to place by automobile and saw much industrial and farming life.

The morning newspapers, commenting favorably on the president's speech, declared that it sounded like a clarion call to better understanding and friendship, although holding out no particular solution to present problems and future possible ones.

**Lindy Coming Soon**

With the American president having departed, the press is depicting quick action by the state to forestall any further attempt at mob violence. Governor Fred W. Green today called representatives of the attorney general's office in conference to determine the state's procedure in meeting out punishment to Adolph Hotelling, confessed slayer of five-year-old Dorothy Schneider.

Governor Green expressed hope that Hotelling could be arraigned after being returned to Genesee county, scene of the crime, and taken to prison without delay.

The prisoner stretched last night almost from the grasp of an infuriated mob of more than 10,000 persons at Flint, spent the night in a quarantine ward of the Michigan reformatory here. He added nothing to his previous confession, maintaining he did not know why he stabbed the child to death and then mutilated her body.

**Seek Change of Venue**

W. E. Seemiller, Owsosso attorney retained by Hotelling's family, also urged a change of venue. He said he had no intention of seeking Hotelling's freedom.

In his confession to state police, Hotelling declared he did not re-

member all that happened at a creek near Mt. Morris where he died Dorothy to her death Thursday. He said he had intended when he first took the child into his car to take her home, but that something, he did not know what, came over him and he drove on down the road. His story of removing her from the car taking her to the creek, telling her he was going to kill her and then stabbing her with his pocket knife, was disconnected. Shown photographs of the mutilated body, Hotelling said: "I don't see how I could do it. I don't know why I did it. I don't know why I should do such a thing."

The mob which stormed the Flint jail last night was dispersed today and state police said they anticipated no further trouble, although they were opposed to returning Hotelling to Genesee county.

## New Avenue Is Open In Chicago Murder Mystery

CHICAGO, Jan. 17 (AP)—Comparison of finger prints on tape used in the slaying of Betty Chambers last Thursday with those of Mrs. Doris Hemphill Kirk, friend of the slain woman, today opened a new avenue of inquiry into the murder case.

The fingerprints of Mrs. Kirk, formerly of Estherville, Iowa, who was arrested as a suspect, were identical with those found on articles in the dead girl's room. She explained that she had bound a cut on Betty's finger with tape several days ago.

James Kirk, husband of the Iowa girl, and Al Bregar, who told of living with Betty sometime ago, also were held for further questioning.

The slain woman was said to be a leader of a gang of gamblers.
