In his annual report, County Agriculturist Harry Avery gives some insight into the things which go to make up this year's busy life in the small things and small things, and when that report is pondered carefully it is seen that the life of a county agent is a very busy one. Mr. Avery reported 443 farm visits and these were to 426 different farms. He received 1758 office calls and 449 telephone calls, one of which was of considerable import to someone and some consuming quite considerable time. There were spent in the office 109 days, and in the field, 193 1/2 days, which shows that Mr. Avery did not take as many days vacation, and holidays as some people do.

Over 2500 pecanias, letters were written, and 17,000 circulars, among different lines of activity. Of the total of 169 days so occupied, they were variously divided as follows:
