HEALTH

BABY HAS A COLD

There is no denying that most colds can be prevented. Babies are especially susceptible to infection by organisms causing colds. They get them very easily and very frequently. If there was some way to prevent this, there would result a greater freedom from distress and disease and a saving of many lives.

Common diseases—tonsillitis, ear disease, pneumonia, and their severe complications, such as mastoid infection—would indeed be rare. To emphasize the seriousness of such diseases, records show that more than half the deaths of babies and young children have their beginning in a common cold infection.

In order to prevent the spread of such respiratory infection, it has been suggested that children be kept separated, but how can this be done? We don't know. However, with babies it is different. They can be kept apart and children to a great extent can be kept away from them, and adults who come in contact with babies can refrain from hugging, kissing, and fondling them. Every adult, healthy or otherwise, probably harbors germs in his nose and throat which, if placed in an infant's nose, would cause disease of greater or less severity; and if he has a cold in the head, a mild case of La Grippe, Sore throat, or cough, he is almost sure to infect any child with whom he comes in close contact. Every member of the family and every well-meaning but insufficiently informed grandmother and neighbor should know this.

Members of the medical profession are trying to prevent disease and are seeking the co-operation of the public to lessen human suffering. The control of scarlet fever, diphtheria, small-pox, and typhoid fever is a result of this endeavor. There is, as yet, no sure procedure known, except isolation, which will prevent the common cold. The doctors know a great deal about how to take care of these conditions when they arise, but they tell us, and we know, that it would be far better if we could prevent their occurrence.

Every individual who is associated in any way with babies and small children should recognize this fact and should consider it a duty to aid in the accomplishment of this object.

Neighbors and their children should keep away from the new baby's door. They should not hold him unless requested, much less kiss him. Grandparents could render infancy a wonderful service if they could refrain from hugging, fondling, and kissing the little pet. The mother and nurse who have direct care of the baby should do all in their power to prevent the happening of any sort of infection which so often becomes infection.

These matters may appear trivial to some and to others, void-blooded, but there is no doubt that the formation of such habits would go a long way toward lowering the present infant morbidity.
