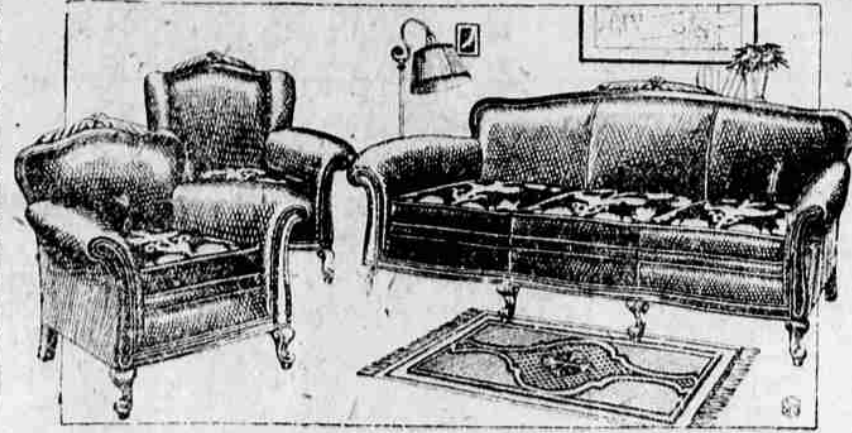

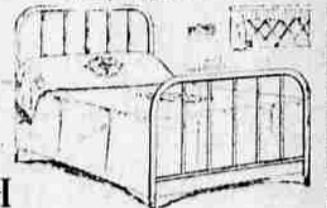

Lloyd Hahn Is Tuning Up For Races With Europe's Best Men

NEW YORK (AP)—America's efforts to retain the track and field supremacy of the world in the Olympics next summer despite the Normis, Wildes and Peltzers of Europe have begun to the tune of Lloyd Hahn's pounding feet.

This sturdy Nebraska middle distance star who runs under the colors of the Boston A. A. is starting in on the indoor boards where he left off last spring with two world records and a victory over the Swedish sensation, Edwin Wide, to his credit.
In his first start at New York recently, Hahn sped a half-mile in 1:53 4-5, missing a world record only because the track was not marked off in accordance with the rules.
His participation in the annual series of indoor athletic carnivals in the east this winter is part of a well-laid campaign which began in his home town of Falls City, Neb., and may end at the finish line of the 800 or 1,500 meter event at both at Amsterdam, Holland.
Trained Carefully
After his spectacular performance of last winter, Hahn retired to his Nebraska home to await the coming of the present indoor season. There he contended himself with keeping in condition. With the coming of cold weather he turned east and after tuning up for a few weeks in Boston announced himself ready for a fairly active indoor season.
If Hahn can beat off the younger generation of American challengers and regain his Olympic berth, he hopes to do considerably better in the games at Amsterdam than he did at Paris in 1924. In the 1,500 meter event there which Nurni won Hahn could finish no better than sixth.
Nurni then was at the top of his career, winning four first places.
Hahn, on the other hand, has come a long way since then, making his greatest achievements indoors. In 1925 he surpassed Nurni's indoor record for a mile in a race in New York, set a world's record of 3:55 4-5 for 1,500 meters indoors at Washington, and eclipsed 2-5 of a second off Nurni's mark for the three-quarter mile. Last winter he set new world records for the 1,000 yards and 1,000 meters events and defeated Wide by four yards in a mile race in which he came within a fifth of a second of the world's record.

Salem Feather Holds Hellman To No Decision

SALFEM, Ore., Jan. 19 (AP)—Chuck Hellman's invasion of the featherweight division received its temporary halt here Wednesday night when Phil Hayes of Salem fought him to a 10-round draw. Hellman could not make his customary body attack function against Hayes' weaving tactics. Hellman was hampered for nine rounds by a deep cut over his left eye.

Failing in his infighting the Portland Finn stepped out to slug with Hayes in the seventh round only to receive a barrage of lefts to the face and a heavy right to the stomach that left him staggering at the end of the round.
Hellman will fight Dick Lohoff in Butte, Mont., Jan. 21.

GENE'S OPPONENT IS YET UNDECIDED

Rickard and Champion Head South for Four-Week Visit in Florida
NEW YORK, Jan. 19 (AP)—Tex Rickard was on his way south today to pick a "logical" opponent for Gene Tunney.
The promoter left New York last night for Miami, Fla., where he plans to spend four weeks with the heavyweight champion, at golf and conference.
On Feb. 1, Rickard will post \$100,000 to bind an option on Tunney's services for 1928 and around the same date he thinks he will have decided who, among the present crop of contenders, will get the next opportunity to knock the crown from the big marine's head.
Rickard caught his train last night after a long and tedious conference with the managers of Jack Delaney and Tom Hooney, whom he hoped to match in a 15-round exhibition bout at Madison Square Garden March 1. Delaney was willing but Charles Hoxsey, manager of the New Zealander, admitted he wasn't so keen about it.
Sharkey vs. Rickard?
Efforts are to be made to match Jack Sharkey, who lost some prestige in his draw battle with Hooney last week, against Johnny Riske, of Cleveland. The latter makes a specialty of taking the logic out of "logical" contenders. This match, if it goes through will be a 15-round affair at the Garden March 12.
Pauline Uzcudun, Rickard disclosed, no longer is being considered in the plans for developing an outstanding challenger for the heavyweight title. Next month Pauline meets George Godfrey, giant negro at Los Angeles.

French Tennis Champion Comes Seeking Title

PARIS (AP)—France, not content with gaining the Davis Cup in lawn tennis, is after new laurels with the racket.
Sailing January 18, on the Aquitania, Pierre Etchebaster, professional court tennis champion of France, will seek the world's open championship now held by Jack Souter, professional at the Philadelphia Racquet club.
The match is set for February 20, 22 and 25 at Souter's club in Philadelphia and will be the first meeting between an American and a Frenchman for a title in any of the court games since Rene Lacoste downed Tilden for the United States lawn tennis championship last September.
Court tennis, which is seven centuries old and the basis of modern lawn tennis, is having a moderate revival here, but is much less played than in England or America.
Etchebaster, who is the professional at a Paris club, hopes to stimulate interest in the game among his countrymen by bringing back the world crown.

Walt Miller Pins Prof. T. Higami
