

Primacy of Pope Bar to Unity in Christian Church

LONDON, Jan. 19. (AP)—Primacy of the pope was indicated to be the bar to unity of the Catholic and Anglican churches on the long-expected report of the famous "Matthew" conference, made public today. The report revealed action taken between 1921 and 1925 by Roman Catholic and Anglican delegates under the presidency of the late Cardinal Mercier.

The publication of the text follows closely upon the rejection by the house of commons of the revised book of common prayer and the recent encyclical of the pope on church union. Objectors to prayer-book changes said they were in direction of Rome, chiefly as concerning the sacrament. The pope said a union of Christians should only come by a return of the dissenting to the original church of Rome.

In regard to papal primacy one of the Anglican delegates said: "We wish for unity, and if the necessary preliminary conditions have been met, we should not shrink from the idea of a papacy, such as a center of unity, but in so saying, we have in view not a papacy such as exists in theory and practice among the Roman Catholics at the present time but a conception of unity such as may emerge in the future."

Was it possible to interpret the spiritual authority of the pope in such a way that the jurisdiction of the English bishops should not be interfered with, he asked. He inquired if this could be secured side by side with recognition of the right claimed by the pope to intervene in matters concerning the general interests of the universal church.

Catholics Answer
In reply the Roman Catholic delegates said the right of the pope to intervene anywhere could not be surrendered, but there might be a question as to how far he need exercise it.

The answer of the Church of England to this was that the English were and always had been a practical people and it was important to know from a Catholic standpoint whether it was conceivable such a right might be maintained consistently with the freedom which Anglicans demand to control their own affairs.

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'Cough Medicine' Causes Death Of Family of Four

CLEVELAND, Ohio, Jan. 19. (AP)—While police today sought to determine the contents of a bottle of "cough medicine" which last night caused the deaths of James Potter, 45, and the three members of his family here, word came from Steubenville, Ohio, his former home, that Potter was once a prominent capitalist there, before he lost a fortune in oil and coal developments.

An indictment returned against him last week, charging that he had obtained money under false pretenses in connection with a real estate and contracting business taken on as a side line to make off a financial collapse, was the last record of his business dealings in Steubenville. The victims of the "medicine" in addition to Potter, 15-year-old

were his wife, Lulu, 43, and their two sons, James Jr., 13, and Elmer, 11.

Quick Death
Roomers at the house were aroused late last night when Elmer and his mother ran screaming from their apartment. Forty-five minutes later the entire family was dead in a hospital.

Elmer had given up some cough medicine. Lulu felt it coming on. Robert cried and collapsed. His mother fell beside him.
