Possible Rival Of Standard Oil Seen in Merger

NEW YORK, Jan. 20 (AP)—A possible rival of the Standard Oil interests for world trade was seen today in announcement of plans for a merger of two of the largest of the so-called independent oil companies in the United States.
The projected merger would bring together, through an exchange of stock, the Texas corporation and the California Petroleum company with combined authorized capitalizations of \$375,000,000. Culmination of the merger is dependent upon the participation of at least 51 per cent of the California company's stockholders.

200 Prisoners Save Lives of Six in Hospital

BOONEVILLE, Mo., Jan. 20 (AP)—Given their freedom by their ward of honor, 200 inmates of the Missouri state reformatory early today rescued six fellow inmates from the reformatory hospital which was destroyed by fire, and then according to officers of the institution returned to their quarters.
Six other patients were able to escape unaided from the burning building but Lee Van St. James, a 15-year-old negro patient suffering from pneumonia, was burned to death in the building.
Officers of the institution directed the boys in their efforts to bring the fire under control and when the hospital, a two-story building containing six wards, was destroyed the boys marched back to their barracks, where it was said a checkup showed that none of the "honorable boys" was missing.
The fire which was of unknown origin was discovered by the reformatory dentist at 1:30. With the aid of the Booneville fire department the flames were prevented from reaching the dairy barns although a high wind was blowing. The loss was said by reformatory officials to be approximately \$40,000.

FOOD MATERIALS AND FOOD VALUES

Science Finds That Crackers are Rich in Energy-Yielding Values

Food materials vary greatly in the amount of protein, fat and carbohydrates which they contain. Some have only one kind of fuel, others two, and some all three, and these in varying proportions. The fuel value of a food material is, then, the amount of energy it is capable of yielding in the body.
The calorie is the standard unit of measurement used in ascertaining the energy or fuel value of different food materials. One calorie represents the amount of heat needed to raise one pound of water four degrees Fahrenheit.
To take care of the internal work of the body, breathing, digestion, muscular activity and for the multiple work of the cells each hour during the 24, one must have a certain number of calories as one's basic requirement. Age, size, occupation and sex all effect the total quantity of food needed, as well as the relative amounts of each kind of food material.
For example, a man weighing 150 pounds, doing active muscular work, needs approximately 3400 calories each day. He requires 60 calories an hour throughout the entire 24 for the internal work of his body. To take care of his eight hours' active labor, he needs 180 calories an hour more. For each of three hours of light activity, he needs 110 more calories per hour, and for five hours' sitting at rest, 40 calories per hour. This gives his total daily caloric requirement of 3440.

shortly before the city tug Maconi with the Irish president and the mayor welcoming committee landed. Three men and a woman marched into the park bearing giant placards which they had difficulty holding up in the gusty wind.
The placards read: "Who is crushing Ireland with debt and taxes—Cosgrave? Who murdered 77 Irish patriots—Cosgrave? Who hates republics—Cosgrave? Who lashed the head of Cosgrave's Irish free state—King George the Fifth?"
Parker descended on the four and demanded their passes. The placard bearer said they had no passes but were members of the De Valera party and wished to voice their protest. They were ushered from the park on their way passing a woman holding high above her head a Union Jack.
Cosgrave did not know much about Mayor "Big Bill" Thompson of Chicago. "Are you going to meet him in Chicago?" he was asked.
"I suppose so," he answered after conferring with one of his party.
"Once, back home," he volunteered, "somebody asked me if Ireland was considering a ban on the exportation of eggs. I didn't know then what the word meant. But when I found out, I told my assessor that I thought any such act as that would be considered unfriendly."

Children's Needs

Boys and girls in their teens need as much food as grown people, and in some cases more.
This is because they have not completed their growth and are unusually active. Children from two to 12 years must be given surprisingly large amounts of food, as compared to grown persons.
There is a widespread misunderstanding as to the caloric content of staple foods. Perhaps no more striking instance exists of this than in the case of crackers and cookies. In the past they have been considered all too generally as merely adjuncts to the meal.
Yet few foods possess as high energy-yielding value as the products of the cookie and cracker factory. Though dainty in structure, delicate in flavor and attractive in appearance, biscuits and crackers are still relatively inexpensive sources of energy, comparing favorably with our common sources of food supply.

Seen floating away from shore on an ice floe last evening the collic, supposed to be lost in the darkness, pulled up an all night vigil and rescue apparatus was made ready for use. Floating ice cakes and the high winds made the launching of a small boat impracticable.
Today the collic was sighted far out in the lake still alive, police said, and attempts were made to reach him.

ing presidential elections.
Vare returned to his home here last night from a vacation in Florida and immediately went into conference with his counsel on the present situation. He refused to deny or confirm the insistent report of leaders in local republican councils that he would resign.
Should he decide to send his resignation to the senate, it was pointed out, he could not do so until the committee on privileges and elections makes a report to the senate on the contest of William F. Wilson, Vare's democratic opponent in the 1924 general election.
Inasmuch as Feb. 24 is the last day on which nominating petitions can be filed in Pennsylvania, it is not considered likely that Vare would resign unless the senate committee had made its report before that time.
Will Seek Action
Consequently all the efforts of Vare and Francis Shunk Brown, his attorney, will be devoted to persuade the committee to act quickly on the contest it was said.
Tomorrow Vare's reply, prepared by Brown, to the stranded petition of Wilson claiming the Philadelphia's election was brought about by "fraud and corruption" in six counties of the state, will be presented to the senate committee.
