ONE OUT OF FIVE PERSONS HAVE "BAD POSTURE" SHOULD BE CORRECTED EARLY

About one person out of every five stands in a good posture. This has been proven by various authorities and this percentage has been calculated from the freshman classes of two of our largest universities.

The incidence of improper posture has become so great that the department of labor of the U. S. government has taken cognizance of it and has published articles upon this subject. Its earliest discovery should be made by the parents or the graded school teachers. The effect of bad posture may be felt throughout life.

It increases susceptibility to disease and also makes one a poor worker. It is an integral part of the community. It prevents a successful career and good citizenship.

It must not be forgotten that a real cause may be behind a bad posture—namely, flat feet, adenoids, tonsils, bad teeth, frequent and prolonged illnesses. These undermine the muscular system and compel a bad attitude.

One should eradicate these contributing factors before attempting an improvement of the posture.

The outdoor exercises for the summer, such as baseball, tennis, swimming, and certain gymnastics for those of improper posture should be taken advantage of.

When the child or the adolescent grows, one has had his day of strenuous exercise. It would be most advantageous for him to be doing for an hour in the late afternoon. Rest of the fatigued muscles is essential.

Good posture in the growing child makes for robust health, efficiency, propriety, and happiness. It is a greater asset than money.

On the contrary, poor posture is a menace and a future liability.

Now that outdoor playtime is being getting up exercises, coincident with the running and running would be good for all, and especially prescribed corrective exercises would be more beneficial given out of doors.

After all contributing factors to bad posture are removed by the family physician, specially educated physical culturists, occupying positions in schools, churches, and hospitals are ready for that to undertake the training and correction of these very obvious and deleterious defects.

The time to correct bad posture is to begin early in childhood. The

"Fighting Love" With Jetta Goudal At Colonial Monday

Jetta Goudal, the petter dark-eyed, exotic film star who has been called the "emotional cocktail of the screen drama," will be seen in another of her striking characterizations at the Colonial theater, coming Sunday and Monday. Victor Varconi and Henry B. Walthall are featured.

The picture is "Fighting Love," described as a romantic drama of love and intrigue ranging from the castle of nobility of Italy to the African desert, with Miss Goudal in the role of a young girl of the Italian aristocracy who, in order to escape marriage with the disreputable son of a great family, Niccolini, whom she despises, accepts the hand of an aged soldier, General Navarro.

From here the story moves to a swift and startling conclusion. In the course of which Vittoria and the adjutant are captured by the Arabs. When word is brought that the General is killed, Vittoria and her lover are married.

Then the revelation! The report of the General's death was false. The denouncement to this powerful drama is one of the most gripping climaxes ever achieved on the screen.

The drama was adapted by Deulah Marie Dix from the novel "If the Gods Laugh" by Rosita Forbes, and was made under the direction of Nils Olaf Christander, supervised by Bertram Millhauser.
