Announce Topics Of Interest For Sunday Services

Sermon Subjects to Be Given From Local Pulpits Tomorrow Promise to Be Unusually Fine.

Regular services will be held in the churches of the city tomorrow. Sermons from many of the pulpits will be of special interest including "Peoples and Recognition in Heaven" which will be the subject on which the Rev. J. George Walz will speak at the First Presbyterian church; by special request, "The Value of a Christian Education" to be given by the Rev. R. L. Putnam of the Central Christian church; "Unorganized Religion," which will be the sermon subject of the Rev. Oliver Riley at St. Peter's Episcopal church; "How Does God Make Himself Known to Us?" to be given by the Rev. L. H. Aves at the English Lutheran church, and others.

A service of special interest in the evening will be an illustrated lecture at the First Methodist Episcopal church entitled "Among the Thatched Huts of Rhodesia," Central Christian Church. The dedication of a Christian service flag, a very impressive service, will be a feature Sunday morning at the Central Christian church. It is "Education Day" and the pastor, the Rev. R. L. Putnam, will speak on the subject "The Value of a Christian Education," during the morning hour of worship at 11 o'clock. The Bible school meets at 9:45 o'clock. Music during this hour will be furnished by the orchestra.

The four Christian Endeavor societies, the junior, intermediate, young people's and senior societies meet at the church at 6:30 o'clock and the evening service begins at 7:30. There will be a song service led by the choir and orchestra, after which the pastor will speak on the subject "The Two Convicts."

First M. E. Church
Sunday school meets at 9:45 o'clock, followed by church services at 11 o'clock at the First Methodist Episcopal church. Epworth League, which meets at 6:30 o'clock in the evening will continue the series of studies on The Christ of the Indian Road. In the evening at 7:30 o'clock there will be the illustrated lecture entitled "Among the Thatched Huts of Rhodesia." A well known hymn, "Jesus Shall Return Where Ever The Sun Does His Successive Journeys Run" will be shown on the screen, and the audience will join in singing it. The choir has also arranged for special music during the morning service. The public is invited to attend all services.

In the evening the Rev. Mr. Walz will speak on "The Doctrine of Man; His Nature and Growing Personality" and the choir will sing "In Heavenly Love Abiding" by Spilster. Miss Daisy Robbs, soprano will sing a solo, "Consider and Hear Me" by Harker.

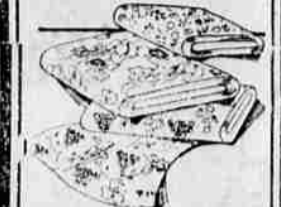
