WASHINGTON, Jan. 23 (AP)—Before a crowd that overflowed the senate chamber and its galleries, Senator Hefflin, of Alabama, resumed today his attack on the Roman Catholic "political machine" and assailed Mayor Gunter, of Montgomery, the capital city of his state.
Hefflin's remarks on Mayor Gunter resulted from an invitation the mayor extended to Senator Robinson, of Arkansas, the democratic leader, to visit Montgomery as the guest of the city and to repeat there his speech of last week in which he rebuked Hefflin for his repeated attacks on the Catholic church.
