Bridge Pointers

Yesterday I gave a hand and suggested that my readers play it and note the result, promising to tell them today what happened when I saw it in actual play. South was the declarer playing a Spade contract; the original lead was the King of Clubs. The cards were distributed as follows:

A diagram showing a card game layout with suits and cards. It includes a list of cards for each suit: Spades (9-6-4, J-10-8, 9-7-5-3-2, Q-J), Hearts (8-5-3, A-Q-4, J-10-6, 10-6-5-3), Diamonds (A-K-9-8, A-K-Q-J-10-2, 9-6-3-2, A-K-8), and Clubs (None).

When the declarer planned his campaign before playing to the first trick, he could see that he must lose one Diamond trick and probably three Heart tricks. His only chance for game would be to discard two of closed Hands Hearts and the only possibility of that would be to establish dummy's Diamonds and then to put dummy in with the Nine of trumps. The difficulty in carrying this plan into effect was that it could not be accomplished without losing one Diamond trick; and if the adversaries then approached the nature of declarer's plans, they would lead three rounds of Hearts and thus save the game. Declarer must keep his adversaries from suspecting his purpose, so he ambushed his plans as carefully as possible.

He ruffed trick 1 with the Jack of Spade, probably the most deceptive card he could use; and, trick 2, led the Eight of Diamonds, taking the slight risk that the adverse Diamonds were divided 4-1 and that the adversary who won the trick would have four, would diagnose the situation and lead a second Diamond for his partner to ruff. Declarer did not at once lead two rounds of trumps for two reasons: (a) Doing so might expose his scheme to the adversaries and induce a lead of Hearts; (b) if the adverse trumps about a party given at the home of Mr. and Mrs. R. A. Wilkinson for Mr. and Mrs. H. DeLane.

IN ACTUAL PLAY the Eight of Diamonds following the ruff with the Jack of Spades worked perfectly. It looked as if another force might seriously deplete declarer's trumps, so a second Club was led. Declarer ruffed it, again with an honor, led two rounds of trumps and then led the high Diamonds. On the third round of Diamonds he had to risk the possibility that West held the remaining Diamond and consequently that East could ruff the third round. If so, he would be throwing away a trick; but it was the only chance for game. As the hand developed, East had the last Diamond and dummy was put in with the Nine of Spades, cashed two established Diamonds, Closed Hand described two small Hearts and declarer lost only two Hearts and one Diamond, consequently making game.
