2 ELGIN MEN SENTENCED BY KNOWLES

Milton, Ore., Asks For Power Permit

WASHINGTON, Jan. 26 (AP)—Wilton City, Ore., today applied to the federal power commission for authority to construct a power house and a dam on the mouth fork of the Walla Walla river in Umatilla county, Oregon. The project would be auxiliary to one already established in Wilton City and would be located partly in the Umatilla national forest. The proposed power output was not limited. Proposes Bacteria Tests

In reference to the proposed milk and cream ordinance, he pointed out the necessity of taking bacteria tests, and, answering a question by the commission, declared that the cost of equipment for this purpose would be about \$400. Answering another question, he said that in his opinion it is unfair to make the milk producer who sells his milk to a creamery or milk depot pay a license fee. He said that a half-time inspector could handle the milk and cream ordinance, but if an extension is made, it would require a full-time inspector.
