TWO EGG GRADES SELL SAME PRICE

Standards and Mediums
Quoted at Identical Figures in Portland

PORTLAND, Ore., Jan. 26 (AP)—An unusual condition exists on the local dairy exchange today in that standard and medium eggs are quoted at identical values. Both grades of standards were reduced two cents and both grades of mediums one cent at the trading session yesterday afternoon. The reductions brought standard and medium extras both down to 31c, and standard and medium firsts both to 29c. Members of the exchange did not notice the usual differential in prices had not been maintained until after the going when it was too late to alter quotations, according to exchange rules. Understated eggs were unchanged in price.

Butter prices are likewise easier today, with cube standards and prime firsts quoted 1/2c lower. Other prices are steady. Quotations on butterfat are also a cent lower with bids as follows: 45c station, 47c track, 49c 5/16 delivered in Portland.

Meats Steady
Country dressed meats are steady with a fair supply coming in and demand good. Hogs are a trifle firmer, with prices for best light stock ranging from 12 1/2 to 13c. Beef prices continue to show a shade easier tone than early in the week but quotations are not appreciably lower. Veal and lamb are steady and firm.

Poultry is moving in good volume. Receipts have been fairly heavy the past few days but local demand has held up well and the market is fairly well cleaned up on all classes. Prices for the most part are quite firm. Demand for choice quality young farm fowls is unusually good for this season and turnover has been quite heavy around 25 to 35c.

Onions are still the subject of considerable talk, with growers asking as high as \$2.50 a ton for U. S. No. 1 grade. Potato movement continues comparatively heavy, but prices are still decidedly weak.

CHICAGO, Jan. 26 (AP)—Opening unchanged to 1/2c higher. Chicago wheat reacted a little and then scored gains all around. Corn and oats likewise developed firmness, corn starting at 1/2c off to 1/2c up, and subsequently making a general advance. Provisions were easy.

Wheat closed unsettled, 1/2 to 1/2c net higher, corn 1/2 to 1/2c off, oats unchanged to 1/2c down, and provisions unchanged to a setback of 1/2c.

Bulls Again In Control; Stock Market Strong

NEW YORK, Jan. 26 (AP)—Speculation for the advance which received a sharp setback yesterday on selling inspired by the increase in the Chicago federal reserve discount rate was resumed with full vigor in today's stock market. Standard industrial and public utility shares moved forward a point or two, recovering most or all of yesterday's lost ground, while several specialties were marked up three to 10 points to new high records. Trading showed a moderate contraction in volume.

The closing was strong. Shorts were punished severely in specialties of which the flowing supply is well controlled, but an assortment of other stocks suffered from profit-taking in the final hour, including U. S. Steel and Hupp Motors. Don Aiol, A. M. Byers, Coty, Wright Aeronautics all made good progress. The ability to bring up new leaders when desired helped to allay any uneasiness over the showing of brokers' loans, to be reported after the close. Total sales approximated 2,800,000 shares.

All bean soups should have a little flour added to them as a binder to prevent the thick part from settling to the bottom. Mix a tablespoon of butter with a table spoon of flour. Add a little of the hot soup, stir until it is smooth and continue adding until a quart of the soup has been used. A tablespoon of chopped parsley sprinkled over the soup at the last minute is attractive.
