EIGHT TEAMS TO PLAY FOR TITLE

Rules for Union Tournament to Be Essentially Same as Last Year

This year's district basketball tournament, to be played at Union Mar. 1, 2 and 3 to determine which team shall represent Union, Walla, Baker, Grant, Malheur and Harney counties at the Salem state tournament, will be conducted along practically the same lines as last year, according to members of the district board.

Double elimination will be followed and the drawings for places will be made at the La Grande High school building at 8 p. m. by a neutral committee on Monday, Feb. 27. All winning teams must be reported to the board not later than Monday night, Feb. 27. Each sub-district may choose its winners in its own way.

The district is divided as follows: Walla county, Union county excepting North Powder and Union, three teams; Baker county, including North Powder, two teams; Grant county, one team; Harney and Malheur counties, one team. Union will furnish the eighth team, being in a district by itself.

The first game will be played Thursday afternoon at 3:30 o'clock.

Play will be continued Friday afternoon, Saturday afternoon and Saturday night. If an extra game is necessary it will either be played Saturday night or Monday at 8 p. m. Fourteen games are assured with the possibility of an extra one to determine the championship. Each team will be allowed eight players only.

Father Kelly To Take Up Boise Duties March 8

BAKER, Ore., Jan. 27--The Rev. Father Edward J. Kelly, of Baker, who has been appointed bishop of the Boise diocese of the Roman Catholic church, will be consecrated here March 8, and will be installed at the cathedral of St. John in Boise by Archbishop Edward D. Howard, two days later, it has been announced.

The Rt. Rev. Joseph McGrath, bishop of the Baker diocese, assisted by Bishop Edward D. O'Brien, of Seattle, and Matthias Lemkau, of Great Falls, Mont., will consecrate the new bishop. The Most Rev. Edward D. Howard, D. D., archbishop of Oregon City, will preach the sermon.

The installation sermon in Boise will be delivered by the Rt. Rev. Charles D. White, D. D., of Spokane.

OREGON STATE COLLEGE, Corvallis, Jan. 27--Four teams--Oregon, Oregon State, Washington, and Montana--still remain undefeated in the race for Pacific coast basketball honors and all four go into action this week end. Washington plays Oregon State at Corvallis, and Montana meets Idaho at Moscow on Friday. Montana meets Washington State at Pullman and Washington meets Oregon at Eugene on Saturday. The California teams rest this weekend.

Washington's decisive victory over Idaho by the score of 27 to 19 sends the Huskies up another notch as favorites in the conference race. Oregon State beat Idaho by three points while Oregon turned the trick on the Vandals by six points. Washington will get a real test when the Huskies invade the Oregon territory. Two games on successive nights with Oregon State and Oregon will just about tell the comparative strength of the three teams which, according to early season prediction, should be in the running for the championship.

Montana will bump up against a tough one when the Grizzlies meet Idaho in the Moscow chess box. Idaho has been next to unbeatable on her own floor in the past.

OREGON VS. HUSKIES

EUGENE, Ore., Jan. 27 (Special)--University of Oregon will meet University of Washington in a crucial basketball game Saturday night in Eugene. As both teams are undefeated the contest will have important bearing on the northern championship race.

Washington has an experienced team in which four of the five places are filled by lettermen. On the other hand, Oregon has only two veterans in the lineup and Bill Reinhart, Webfoot coach, is having no little difficulty in whipping the individuals into a team.

Washington is a five-point favorite to beat Oregon. However, the Webfoots have shown considerable improvement with each succeeding game, and if Dave Epps, who is breaking in as a regular at guard, is able to play Saturday, Oregon should have a fairly good chance against the Huskies. Dave has an injured ankle.

Gordon Ridings and Mervyn Chastain, both of Eugene, are handling the forward berths, with Shosty Milligan, another Eugene lad, playing center and Epps, who starred for Franklin high school at Portland several years ago, and Joe Bally, Eugene, taking care of the guards.

Ray Edwards of Milton, Bernard Hummel of La Grande, Ick Reynolds of Eugene, Jack Dawslett of Greenham, and Don McCormick of Eugene, are first string subs. So far Oregon has lost only one game this season--to Whitman college, 27 to 26. This was not a conference contest. The Webfoots have won both of their conference starts defeating Idaho 25 to 23, and Washington State, 33 to 16.

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TRIS MAY RETURN TO BOSTON TEAM

Speaker Is Being Sought by Both Red Sox and Giants, Report

NEW YORK, Jan. 27 (AP)--Baseball idea which shifted Tris Speaker to various major league ports appeared in a position today to carry him back to his first love Boston.

He has been released from the Senators and there are reports that he is being sought by the Red Sox and Giants.

The Boston settling would bring Tris back to the club where he made his start to fame on the big circuits and with Bill Carrigan at the helm he would be under the orders of his old boss during the pennant days of 1915.

He took part in two championships with the Red Sox in 1912 and 1915. On April 12, 1916, he was traded to the Cleveland Indians for Thomas and Jones and a cash consideration. The deal brought considerable protest from the fans but in spite of his loss, Carrigan went out that same year

and annexed another pennant for the Hub.

BOSTON ISSUES DENIAL. BOSTON, Jan. 27 (AP)--"Nothing to it," was the comment of Jim Price, secretary of the Boston Red Sox, on reports that the Red Sox were angling for the services of Tris Speaker. "We haven't been in communication with Speaker in any way. President Quinn is building up a club of youngsters, and Speaker wouldn't fit into the program at all," Price said.
