FOCAL INFECTION

The diseased condition that causes the greatest loss to the world at large is that known as "Focal Infection." By this is meant a small collection of disease-producing micro-organisms in some portion of the body, from which point certain poisonous substances are absorbed and distributed by the blood stream to all portions of the body, rendering the individual markedly substandard.

While any portion of the body may be the site of a focus, the most common are the tonsils, teeth, respiratory system, and the gastro-intestinal tract. There may be no symptoms referable to the site of the focus, yet grave conditions may be produced in a remote portion of the body, as appendicitis from a focus in the tonsils, articular rheumatism from a singular condition at the root of a tooth, or an abscess of the liver from an intestinal infection.

The acute conditions are infinitesimal as compared to the chronic states of ill health caused by this condition, as a study of the patients in our large hospitals brings to light the lamentable fact that, with proper care and attention, these individuals, for the most part objects of charity, would be useful citizens in their respective communities had they taken proper care of their bodies and heeded the early signs of a departure from the normal.

By correct living, which means cleanliness of mind and body, wholesome food, regular hours of work, recreation, and rest, health, happiness, and wealth will come to abide with us for all time.

To arrive at the ideal condition, universal co-operation must be attained, and to this end education must begin in the home and continue from the cradle to the grave. Man was born to die, but there is no reason why all, with a few negligible exceptions, should not pass in good condition, the allotted three score and ten.

Price of Forage Being Determined

Kale can be grown and delivered to the farm more cheaply in many sections of Oregon thanilage, and alfalfa hay may be grown almost as cheaply in various parts of the Willamette valley as in the irrigated regions east of the mountains. These facts are gathered from a three year cost of production survey of forage crops nearing completion by H. E. Selby, associate in farm management, of the Oregon experiment station and C. D. Schoolcraft, field assistant.

This is the most extensive forage crop cost survey ever conducted in Oregon under this project. The first wild hay survey in the U. S. has just been completed in Harney county. More than 118,000 acres of wild hays are grown in Oregon. This is more than any other hay crop except small grains and alfalfa.

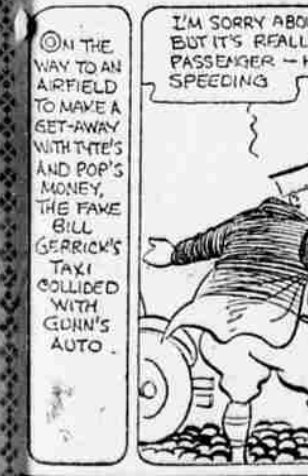
