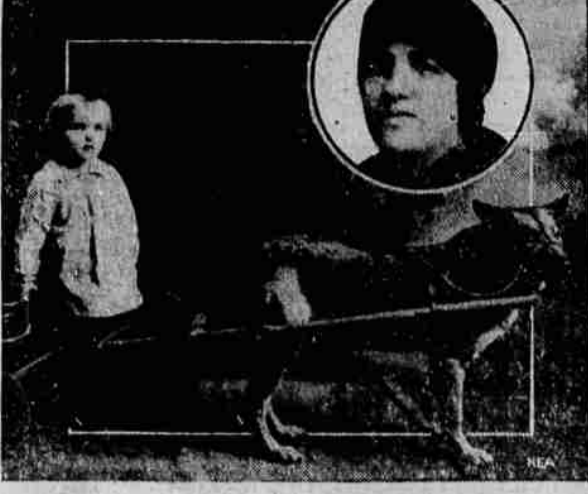

Mr. Ripley today. In this country we make motors do the work that is done by hands in other countries.

"American factories have three times the production per employe that British factories have and American wages are almost three times as high as those paid British workmen. Lush waste of horsepower has made this possible.

"That is why industrial commissions from all parts of the world come to see how America does it. It seems to them that it is impossible to pay high wages and sell products cheaper than those turned out by factories of other nations where cheap labor is available.

"A one horsepower motor will do the muscular work of ten men. In this country men furnish the brains and motors furnish the muscular power. One man today can turn out more work than 100 blacksmiths or other mechanics in older days.

"Americans own 22,000,000 of the 27,500,000 automobiles in the world," he said. "Holland boasts of 45,000 autos and 700,000 bicycles. Great Britain has 380,000 cars in operation and most of them range from 4 to 12 horsepower.

"When a European speaks of his big six car, he means six horsepower not six cylinders," Mr. Ripley said.
