"Les Miserables" Opening At Arcade Tuesday

France may well be proud of the epic film portrayal of Victor Hugo's famous classic "Les Miserables," which will be shown Tuesday and Wednesday at the Arcade theater.

Gabriel Garcia, in the character of Jean Valjean, proves himself a sterling actor. His role is a difficult one to portray, but he makes the part his own. He is first seen in the prison scenes. These, incidentally, were taken at the old prison at Toulon convicts enacting the extra roles.

When the energies from the gray walls after his long imprisonment he presents a figure that is for ailing indeed, for the remaining spark of human sympathy in the man has been buried deep under the hardened lava of hate.

The striking transition that takes place after the kindness of Father Myriel has fanned the dying spark of love into a fire of regeneration is portrayed by Garcia with matchless art.

The sensational scenes at the barricades when the soldiers of the Empire storm the stronghold of the communists are exciting in the extreme and filled with pulsating drama. Throughout the entire length of the stupendous production one is held in the grip of interest, sympathy and heightened suspense. It is a really great picture.

The Western Union system of training messenger boys is proving of a definite value to the boys enrolled in this work, both in reference to future business openings and in teaching responsibilities essential to future work, is the word spread by James H. West, chief boy scout executive, according to Fred Perry, local manager.

"I have made it my business to look into their method of handling boys. The result has been stimulating and most satisfactory," Mr. West is quoted as saying.

In La Grande several messenger boys are employed, the number varying at different times of the year, and each is equipped with a complete uniform. The importance of neatness, speed, accuracy and courtesy are impressed upon the boys that serve them in good stead later.

To give one an idea of the size of the messenger boy service, Mr. Terry points out that within a single year, the company transmits and delivers in the neighborhood of 200,000,000 telegrams to all parts of the world. Almost the entire task of delivery rests with the 15,000 messengers employed.

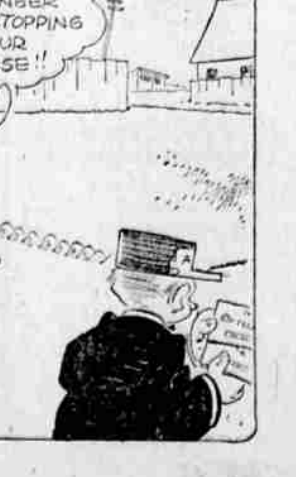
