LITTLE WHEAT IS UNSOLD IN STATE

Pendleton Man Estimates That Not More Than 18 Per Cent Off Market

PENDLETON, Ore., Jan. 31. (Special)—Of the 50 million bushel wheat crop of Oregon, Washington and Idaho harvested in 1927, not more than 18 per cent yet remains to be sold, in the opinion of Henry Collins, local grain man, who bases his estimate upon information received from various parts of the three states.

Usually at this time of year there remains as much as 30 per cent of the previous year's crop. Mr. Collins believes that the good prices paid for the 1927 crop caused farmers to be eager to sell, the majority of the wheat moving at \$1.18 to \$1.20. Umatilla county's crop was better than 7,000,000 bushels. Farmers, says Mr. Collins, are well pleased with prospects for this year and if nothing untoward happens the crop should be an excellent one, what with the plentiful moisture received in the fall. He has not had reports of frost injuring the fall sown wheat.

SHIPS \$120,540 WHEAT

VALE, Ore., Jan. 31.—The 1927 wheat crop from farms immediately tributary to Vale was worth more than \$120,450, estimated from the report of H. S. Humphrey, deputy agent, who advises that 85 carloads were shipped out during the year. This, of course, does not include wheat sold locally, fed here or that trucked out. About 114,800 bushels were shipped. The average selling price was \$1.95 a bushel.
