MENUS

By Sister Mary
BREAKFAST—Sliced bananas with ready to serve cereal, cream, plain omelet with tomato sauce, eggless muffins, milk, coffee.

LUNCHEON—Vegetable chowder, toasted crackers, cress and orange salad, old-fashioned bread pudding, milk, tea.

DINNER—Pot roast of fish, steamed potatoes in parsley butter, creamed cabbage, lemon meringue pie, milk, coffee.

Any thick fish steak can be used for the pot roast. Cod, halibut, salmon or haddock are usually well-known white swordfish, tuna and turbot are delicious when available.

Pot Roast of Fish
Two pounds halibut steak, 4 tablespoons butter, 1 onion, 2 cups tomato puree, 1 tablespoon minced parsley, 2 teaspoons sugar, 1/2 teaspoon salt, 1 bunch leeks, 2 peppercorns.

Melt butter in heavy iron kettle or pot-roaster. Add onion finely minced and cook until brown. Sear fish on both sides in hot fat.

Put fish in hot fat, cover with tomato puree, sugar, salt, peppercorns and leeks finely minced to tomato pulp and bring to the boiling point. Pour over the fish in kettle, cover closely and cook over a low fire for one and one-half hours. Serve on a hot platter surrounded by the sauce.

Bridge Pointers

CONTRACT BRIDGE

Yesterday's article and today's deal with original Major suit-bids of two at Contract Bridge. Two example hands were given yesterday and two more follow:

Hand No. 1
 ♠ A-Q-J-X-X
 ♥ X-X
 ♦ A-Q-J-X
 ♣ X

Hand No. 2
 ♠ X-X-X
 ♥ K-Q-J-X-X
 ♦ A-X
 ♣ A-Q

Some contend that a Major two-bid should positively announce the Ace of the suit that is bid, and that a Major three-bid should deny the presence of that card. Others are equally positive in asserting that a Major two-bid should deny the Ace and show less strength in the suit than a one-bid, although possibly more length; and that a Major three-bid should never be made without the Ace of the suit named. Such schemes are devised mainly to promote "slam bidding."

They may work well in the occasional hand which is built to order to suit the particular scheme; but in the long run specialized bidding hampers the bidder by limiting the information conveyed by his bids.

Later in this series, under the head of "Slam Bidding," the various artificial aids which have been invented to promote bidding for slams, will be fully discussed (with the emphasis on the "seemed"), but for the present it is only necessary to say that the successful contract bidder is the one who shows to his partner the actual strength of his hand. Such bidding arrives at possible slams about as often as specialized slam bidding does, and also avoids the danger of overbidding and its resultant severe losses.

Normal informative bidding must be credited with a percentage of success in reaching two objectives:

(a) Producing the Contract which would have been named if the partners had seen each other's hands;

(b) Producing game-going bids whenever there is such strength in the combined hands that the making of a game may reasonably be expected.

We have seen that original bids of two No Trumps by Second Hand after Dealer's pass, by Third Hand after two passes, and by Fourth Hand after three passes, require exactly the same strength as is required for an initial bid of two No Trumps by the Dealer. The same uniformity in bidding qualifications applies to original suit-bids of two by any of the four players. It is only initial one-bids which require less strength for Dealer, than is requisite for Third or Fourth Hand.

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INDIANS STEAL WIVES UNHAMPERED BY LAW

SANTA FE, N. M. (AP)—Wife stealing among the Pueblo Indians of New Mexico is a problem which reservation agents and superintendents face with hands tied.

The latest census shows there are 905 more Indian men than women in New Mexico. The Indians are under federal laws, which do not prohibit an Indian man from appropriating another's squaw, if she consents. Something should be done about it, the superintendent of northern Pueblos advised his superiors in Washington.

PHONOGRAPHS IN HOLY LAND

JERUSALEM—Now can be told what became of all those phonographs with the big horns—they're never in Palestine. No cafe is complete without one and a fairly complete collection of recordings of oriental music and popular Arab songs. Western music is growing in favor. Germany supplies most of the new machines imported.

As a variation of the familiar combination known as Hawaiian or Honolulu salad—a ring of canned pineapple with cream cheese on a bed of lettuce—put the cream cheese through a potato ricer and drop it on the pineapple. Season with salt and a little paprika pepper.

Another suggestion is to mix the cream cheese with chopped nuts, green pepper or pimiento, and form it into balls or roll balls of cheese in one or another of these garnishes. Finely chopped pineapple mixed with cheese makes an excellent spread for sandwiches or for toasted bread or crackers for afternoon tea.

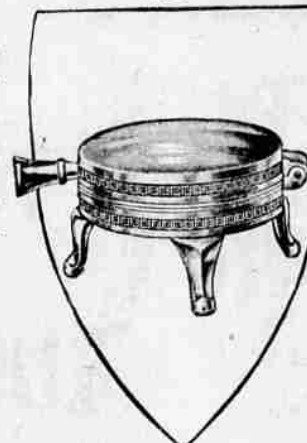

AVERAGE FARM FAMILY IS UNDER-NOURISHED

WASHINGTON (AP)—Surrounded by food, the average American farm family is not getting enough to eat.

Federal statisticians explain the apparent ambiguity.

From the standpoint of bulk the farmer gets all the food he needs and more. But records collected during the last six years from more than 4000 rural homes reveal that food used by the individual family very frequently is too low in minerals—calcium, phosphorus, and iron. In every case the deficiency is caused by the fact that milk, fruit, and vegetables are not provided in sufficient quantities to insure best growth and development.
