Favors Lomski To Defeat Mike McTigue Tonight

NEW YORK, Feb. 3 (AP)—Mike McTigue, carrying the scars of some 750 ring battles, returns to the pugilistic ring tonight in a 10-round bout in Madison Square Garden with Leo Lomski, hard hitting youngster of Aberdeen, Wash., who aspires to scale the heights of the light heavyweight division. Lomski is favorite at 9 to 1 to take the verdict.

The venerable Irishman twice held the 175 title, winning it in 1922 from Battling Siki, losing it two years later to Paul Berlenbach, and then being designated as champion by the New York athletic commission in 1927 when Jack Delaney relinquished the crown to seek other laurels among the heavyweights. But Tommy Loughran outspeeded McTigue last fall to win the title and Mike must now start all over again.

Lomski at the age of 24 has established himself as a hard punching, always aggressive, battler, who twice dumped Tommy Loughran to the canvas for nine counts in the first round of their recent rematch, which the champion won by outboxing his Aberdeen opponent over the rest of the route.

The victor of tonight's fray has been protailed consideration in the elimination for Loughran's next challenger, Jimmy Slatery, Buffalo lad, and Joe Sekyra, of Dayton, Ohio, are also in the running. Sekyra has been matched to box George Gemas, of Philadelphia, next Monday night at the St. Nicholas arena.

OREGON QUINTS PLAY SATURDAY

Washington Still Leads North Conference with Perfect Percentage

OREGON STATE COLLEGE, Corvallis, Feb. 3.—The winner of the Oregon-Oregon State basketball game at Eugene Saturday night should have the best chance of any of the northern colleges in eliminating Washington from the championship race, according to basketball critics here. Idaho is considered as having only an outside chance as the Vandals have already dropped three games. Montana although having lost only one game and that to Idaho has not received any real test of her strength. The Grizzlies, however, may spring a surprise this year.

Washington at the top of the list with four victories and no defeats has six more games on schedule. One of the toughest of those games will be against Idaho at Moscow. Idaho is a hard team to lick on her own floor and the chances are that Idaho might turn the trick. Washington must also travel to Missoula for a game with Montana. The outcome of this game will depend on the showing the Grizzlies make against the Huskies at Seattle this weekend. Washington is doped to lose to either Oregon or Oregon State when these teams clash in Seattle.

If Oregon, Oregon State, and Idaho should each beat Washington things would be thrown into a muddle. Even if Washington loses only two games the conference is liable to end up in a knot. Most critics are of the opinion that the winner of the northern division championship will not lose more than two games. This would eliminate Idaho right now. To consider themselves in the running both Oregon and Oregon State must defeat Montana next week while the Grizzlies are making their road trip.

MEDFORD, Ore., Feb. 3 (AP)—Playing at Ashland last night, the Salem High school basketball team defeated Ashland High 22 to 21 in a game featured by long distance shooting by both teams, defensive play by the home team, and a few shots. Silver Lining In Maharajah's Cloud Shows Up

BOMBAY, India, Feb. 3 (AP)—The suggestion of a Punjab Muslim that the former maharajah of Indore turn from Hinduism to Mohammedanism apparently convinced Hindus that after all it would be possible to convert Miss Nancy Ann Miller, of Seattle, Wash.

After conversion she would be able to marry the former ruler under Hindu rites and the religious obstacle to their marriage would be surmounted.

The proposal that both the former maharajah and Miss Miller become Muslims and marry with Mohammedan rites channeled the former unbending attitude of the Hindus toward the supposed unfitness of Miss Miller to embrace their religion.

No sooner had the Muslim proposal become public than editors of two vernacular papers devoted to the Hindu cause telegraphed to the former maharajah. They told him if he would say the word they would make all necessary arrangements for Miss Miller's conversion. They assured him that the American girl's initiation into Hinduism could be arranged easily.

Heavy Rainfall In North California

REDDING, Cal., Feb. 3 (AP)—Northern California was in the grip of a heavy rainstorm yesterday, with particular force in Trinity county, the upper Sacramento River canyon and Eastern Shasta county. The river here is rising rapidly. However, in spite of the heavy rainfall of last week, precipitation here this season, which has now reached a mark of 23.31 inch, is nearly ten inches behind the mark of last year, which at this time reached 32.12 inches.

PELTZER VICTOR IN MILLROSE RACE

German Distance Runner Defeats Ray Dodge in a Sensational Finish

NEW YORK, Feb. 3 (AP)—Dr. Otto Peltzer, German philosopher and foot-racing champion, has to his credit a sensational victory over some of America's foremost middle distance runners as a result of his much discussed indoor debut.

While the doctor's most formidable American rival, Lloyd Hahn, spent his time coasting to an easy victory in the mile run, the German star last night brought a Madison Square Garden crowd of 12,000 spectators to its feet yelling as he raced to a thrilling triumph in a 1,000-yard race over nine American runners. The occasion was the annual meet of the Millrose A.

There was no record breaking to the debit of Dr. Peltzer, who holds the world's half mile standard, but the tall, blonde Teuton exhibited a flashy brand of speed as well as unusual gueness in winning under strange and difficult conditions.

Ray Dodge, member of the 1924 Olympic team and former national 1,000-yard champion, furnished the chief opposition for Peltzer after the pack sifted out. These two put up a stirring nip and tuck duel over the last three laps of the six lap race but Peltzer had the most in reserve and won by five yards in 2 minutes 18 3/5 seconds. The world's record for the distance 2:12 4/5 is held by Hahn.
