TEST CASE FILED
SALEM, Ore., Feb. 3 (AP)—Life insurance policies totaling \$52,000,000, about 10,000 policies in all, are affected by an original mandamus proceeding filed in the supreme court today by the state on relation of Adolph Kahn of Germany against Judge George Tanvall of the circuit court for Multnomah county.

The suit seeks to compel Tanvall to take jurisdiction in the case of Kahn against the New York Insurance company, in which Kahn is attempting to recover \$5770 on a policy issued in Germany in 1903. It is a test case.

John Ward Sr., passed away at the home of his son, Ben Ward, at 2010 Cedar street this morning. He was born Oct. 6, 1862 and was 75 years, three months and 28 days of age at the time of his death. He was a retired minister of the Baptist church.

WILLIAM SWIGER
UNION (Special)—William Swiger, Union pioneer, died Saturday morning at Hat Lake at the age of 67 years.

He was born at Sarp county, Nebraska, October 10, 1850. In 1884, he crossed the plains with his parents and settled in High Valley where he has since made his home.

On October 18, 1882, he was married to Laura Crosby, of Union, and from this union, three sons were born, Willis of Buhl, Idaho, Ernest of Portland and Lloyd of San Jose, Cal. His wife died in 1889.

Mr. Swiger was married to Delia Snively in 1892. To this union one son was born, Earl Swiger, of High Valley.

Besides his widow and children, he is survived by one brother, Elmer of Union, two sisters, Mrs. Nora Rumley of Dallas, Oregon, and Mrs. Viola Larned of Portland. There are eight grandchildren.

Funeral services were held Monday afternoon at two o'clock from the Cook Bros. chapel, with the Rev. Robert C. Lee in charge. Burial was in the local cemetery under the auspices of the Woodmen of the World, of which he was a member.

B. J. Hawthorne, 90, Dies in Eugene
EUGENE, Ore., Feb. 3 (AP)—Benjamin James Hawthorne, 90, retired attorney and former professor of the University of Oregon, died this morning at 11 o'clock at his home here.

Prof. Hawthorne was born in Lunenburg county, Virginia, June 13, 1837. He was educated at Randolph Macon college from which he received the degree of master of arts in 1861. He taught in various schools and colleges and universities from 1865 to 1916.

Paris Skirt Lengths Remain Stationary

PARIS (AP)—The fashionable silhouette remains the same for spring with skirts at the same level, a few inches below the knee for daytime and almost any length between the knees and the ankles for evening.

A few houses show slightly lengthened day skirts but most of the longer skirts are an example with uneven hemlines for hemlines and are placed where they look best, everything considered. For sport clothes and informal morning costumes the skirts are just long enough to cover the knees well.

"There are many changes in the details of the new fashions and accessories are more important than ever."

The spring fashion collections illustrate more forcibly than for several seasons that the days of overnight changes in the mode are gone. Women obviously like the styles as they are. If they didn't the designers would have to change them, an important consideration.

"Only accessories and style details change suddenly," he said. "The big changes, like the general outline, shifting of mass and thickening or slenderizing of the figure are gradual and evolutionary. The entire beauty and balance of clothes depends on proportion. If skirts were to suddenly become longer—they couldn't be much shorter—the entire silhouette would have to be reproporioned."
