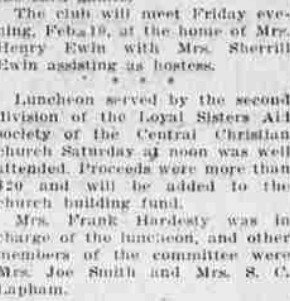
Modern Angles

Bridge Pointers

Last Tuesday and Wednesday we considered Declarer's plan of campaign; today, tomorrow and Thursday we continue the same subject. Take the following first-trick situation in a No Trump:

It is immaterial which Club Declarer plays from Dummy, but it is good practice always to plan the campaign before touching a Dummy card. Declarer sees that he can make two Spade tricks, two Heart tricks, one Club trick and almost certainly four Diamond tricks—a total of nine, game—provided the adversaries do not take more than four tricks before Declarer is able to establish and run his Diamonds. He cannot be sure whether or not he can keep them from doing this because he cannot tell how the eight adverse Clubs are divided. He knows that West has at least four as he would not have opened a short suit, but it is possible that he has five or six. Declarer sees, therefore, that whether West can save the game by running his Clubs probably will depend upon whether he can obtain the lead after the Ace of Clubs is played by the Closed Hand.

One adversary will be sure to obtain the lead with the Ace of Diamonds because Declarer cannot make game without opening that suit; but Declarer cannot tell whether that Ace is held by West or East. If West hold it and has led from more than four Clubs, game cannot be made; if West had only four Clubs (in which case East must have four), it does not matter where the Ace of Diamonds is because East & West could not win more than three Clubs; if East has the Ace of Diamonds and West has more than four Clubs, game can be made by exhausting East's Clubs before he gets the lead.

Declarer therefore plans to hold up his Ace of Clubs until the third round of that suit and then to lead his King of Diamonds. If the Ace do not take it, he will follow with his Jack of Diamonds and, unless the Ace be played by West, will play the Queen from Dummy so as to continue Diamonds from Dummy and to establish that suit before Dummy part with its Ace of Hearts entry.

DINNER—Pan-broiled sirloin steak, French fried potatoes, creamed cauliflower, stuffed prune salad, bean rolls, canned strawberries, plain cake, milk, coffee.

An attractive way to serve canned berries of any sort is to drain them from their juice, add gelatine to the juice and when this is beginning to set return the berries. Let chill and become firm before serving. A garnish of whipped cream can be added, making quite a "dressy" dessert.

Shrimps in tomato sauce would be nice to serve to your bridge club. Accompany the shrimps with celery hearts, olives and tiny pickles and serve a fruit sherbet or ice with sponge cake for dessert.

Shrimps in Tomato Sauce—One cup canned shrimps, 1 cup hot-bolled rice, 1 cup cream, 2 tablespoons butter, 1 tablespoon flour, 1 teaspoon minced onion, ½ teaspoon salt, ¼ cup tomato catsup, ¼ teaspoon pepper, 6 triangles toast, parsley.

Break shrimps in pieces. Melt butter, add onion and cook over a low fire for five minutes. Stir over flour and stir until thoroughly blended. Add shrimps, rice and cream and stir lightly with a fork. Make very hot and add salt, catsup and pepper. Serve on triangles of hot toast and garnish with sprigs of parsley.

THE GARDEN

START FLOWER SEEDS EARLY

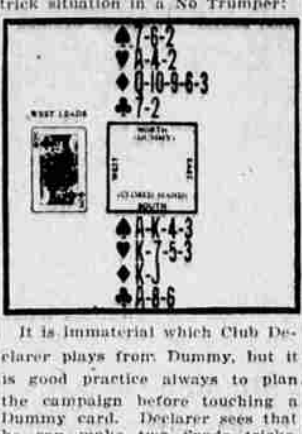
The earlier the seeds of annuals which are to furnish the main summer display can be started, the earlier they will begin to bloom and the longer will be their season of beauty. Get seed boxes ready by easy stages, picking them up in convenient depths and sizes as they can be found and then when planting time comes along in March which skids along almost before you know it, everything will be ready for the spring seed sowing here.

Get in clods of frozen earth from the garden to thaw and dry out to fill the seed boxes. After the soil has thawed and dried, bake it in a hot oven to kill weed seeds and insects that may be lurking in the soil. Stow it away and mix with a little pulverized sheep manure and have it ready to sift into the seed boxes when the time comes.

These are details usually left until the last minute, but their preparation early in the season will go a long way towards making the raising of plants from seeds a success and will do away with the usual delays. If the soil is prepared and sifted and set away, it is a short job to get the seeds planted.

Be on the lookout for panes of glass to cover the seed boxes and pick up a bundle of pot labels to mark the rows in the seed boxes when you think of it. Some of the finest small gardens are made each year from annuals started indoors in seed boxes and in sunny windows. It has also been found a very practical plan to plant seed in flat, shallow boxes and set them into the hot bed or cold frame rather than to plant directly in the soil. The boxes may then be lifted bodily and taken to the garden for transplanting with the least disturbance to the seedlings. It also offers a means of regulating moisture as some plants are more prone to damping off in their seedling stage than others. Look over the garden tools and

MODERN MAGIC APPLIED TO PLANTS



The modern magic—radium—makes plants grow twice as fast, twice as big and twice as beautiful, according to Albert Miller, radium experimenter of Auburn, Cal. Saturating water with the vital rays of radium, he irrigates his garden, and grows plants like the one shown at the right, in contrast to the other specimen which had an equal start in life, but received only ordinary water during a four-week test period. Miller claims his radioactive water will assist human growth and retain human health in similar fashion.

LONG SKIRT FASHION PLEASES YOUNG

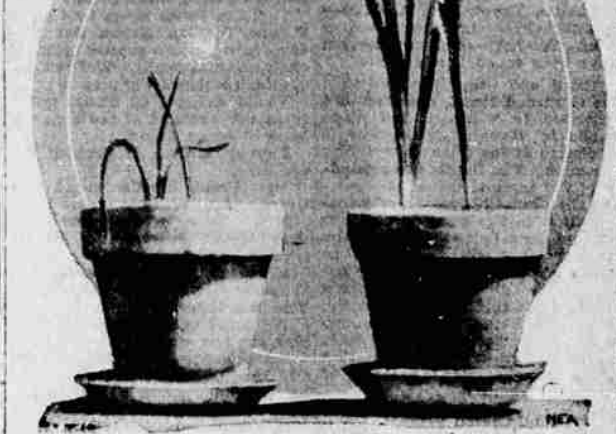
PARIS (AP)—The day is gone when the young girl wants to look and dress as much as possible like her mother.

PARIS (AP)—Clothes with bathing suit lines are growing into vogue, says Jean Charles Worth, fashion head of the oldest dress-making shop in the Rue de la Paix.

The demand for fitted styles, he believes, is the result of woman's diet and exercise.

"We may expect to see corsets fitted on bathing suit lines this spring," he declares. "Women with good figures naturally want to show them. We are constantly asked for things fitted to bathing suit lines. I don't mean things with normal waistlines necessarily, but clothes that are fitted above the hips, with shaped bodices."

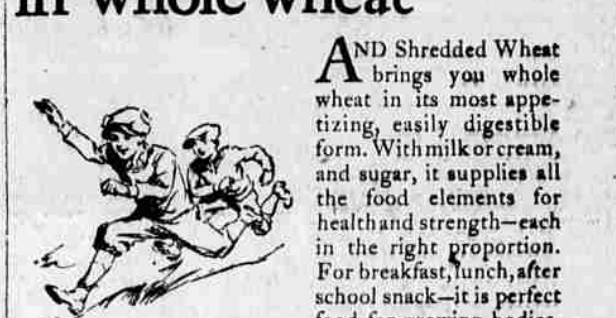
Fashion, according to Monsieur Worth, has just completed a 10-year cycle and arrived at the place it started out from after the war. The masculine mode, a post-war manifestation, is definitely done and women have settled back to the before-the-war idea of fashion and the feminine philosophy of clothes, he thinks.

Sport clothes are definitely relegated to their beginnings, the golf courses, tennis court, yachts and country wear, declares Worth. He is not sure that American women will follow Europe's lead and banish two-piece dresses of the sports type for afternoon wear. But in Europe, he says, the bridge table and the drawing room now require afternoon dresses.
