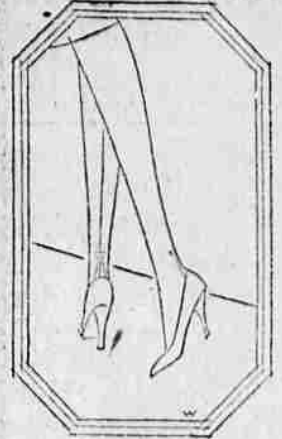

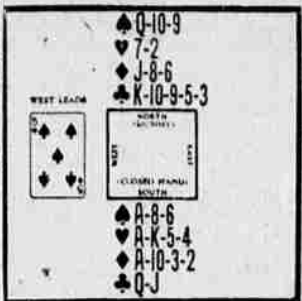

## Bridge Pointers

Yesterday the two hands of a Declarer and the card originally led were given, and the question was: How should Declarer plan his campaign as soon as he sees Dummy's cards and knows the exact 26 cards with which he must operate? The declaration was No Trump, and the hands were as follows:

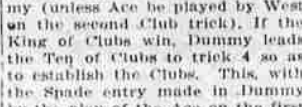


Declarer would see that East cannot have any Spade as high as the Five. Applying the Rule of Eleven to the lead of the Spades Five (11-5-6) shows that exactly six Spades higher than the Five are out against West—and Declarer has them all. So the leader must hold the King-Jack-Seven of Spades. Declarer is therefore sure of two Spade tricks, two Heart tricks, one Diamond trick, and to make game needs four Club tricks. He can win these Club tricks without difficulty if he can get in Dummy to run Dummy's long Clubs after they have been established by the playing of the adverse Ace; but he can be sure that the adversary who has the Ace of Clubs will hang on to it if he can, until satisfied that the Closed Hand has not another Club to lead, and this can be done unless the Ace of Clubs is an improbable singleton.

The ability of the Declarer to make game therefore probably depends upon whether he can find an entry in Dummy after Dummy's Clubs are established. This he will not be able to do unless he makes it by playing his Ace of Spades on the first trick, even although Dummy already has won that trick. Over-taking will not cost a Spade trick—Declarer still will take two Spades—and it will insure an entry in Dummy. Having planned the hand in that way, Declarer plays the Nine of Spades from Dummy and, when East plays small wins with the Ace.

He then leads the Queen of Clubs from Closed Hand to trick 3, playing the King of Clubs from Dummy (unless Ace is played by West on the second Club trick). If the King of Clubs win, Dummy leads the Ten of Clubs to trick 4 so as to establish the Clubs. This, with the Spade entry made in Dummy by the play of the Ace on the first trick, insures game for Declarer.

## MENUS

**By Sisters Mary**  
**BREAKFAST**—Sections of grapefruit, cereal, cream, cracked dried beef, crisp toast, milk, coffee.

**LUNCHEON**—Oyster stew, toasted crackers, celery and cabbage salad, prunes and marshmallows pudding, milk, tea.

**DINNER**—Broiled cod steaks, potato souffle, steamed spinach with lemon, cranberry pudding, milk, coffee.

The luncheon pudding is planned especially for children, but is "tasty" enough to be relished by their elders. Very often dessert makes an otherwise uninteresting meal quite worth while for a child and the anticipation of a sweet at the end of the meal helps the unappetizing foods to disappear happily.

**Prune and Marshmallow Pudding**  
One-half pound prunes, 2 cups water, 1 tablespoon gelatine, 4 tablespoons cold water, 1/2 cup sugar, 1 tablespoon lemon juice, 12 marshmallows.

Scrub prunes well. Cover with water and let stand twenty-four hours. Simmer in the same water for one hour. Remove stones and cut in small pieces. Add to juice. Soften gelatine in cold water for ten minutes and stir into reheated prune pulp and juice. Stir until gelatine is dissolved and add sugar and lemon juice. Cut marshmallows in quarters and when gelatine is beginning to set, stir in the

marshmallows. Turn into a mold to chill and become firm. Serve with whipped cream or boiled custard.

## THE GARDEN

### PROBLEMS OF CITY GARDENERS

City gardeners are confronted with problems vastly different from dwellers in the wider spaces of the country, particularly the dwellers on farms and estates of several acres. The latter may select the choicest site on the property for a vegetable garden. The city lot or back yard garden offers no such elasticity of choice and no selection as to the quality of the soil.

Yet the many thousands of city gardeners are playing a most important part in providing a substantial increase in the food supply of the nation but their possibilities are hardly touched for there are thousands of acres of unoccupied land in and around our cities that can be utilized for food production, thousands upon thousands of backyards that might well be utilized for the purpose and which are serving no other good use.

Transportation of freight is one of the great national problems. The city back yard or vacant lot garden provides home vegetables without the cost of transportation and handling and the cumulative effect would remove a large factor from the carriage problem. Vegetables in the home garden are more palatable, fresher and of higher quality than those which have been brought from a distance. Quality in vegetables is the one factor that cannot be bought in the market.

The millions who work in offices, stores and manufacturing plants have hours in the morning or evening that might well be devoted to the garden, providing the healthiest kind of exercise. These hours usually are wasted in no valuable pursuit. The garden should be of family interest and

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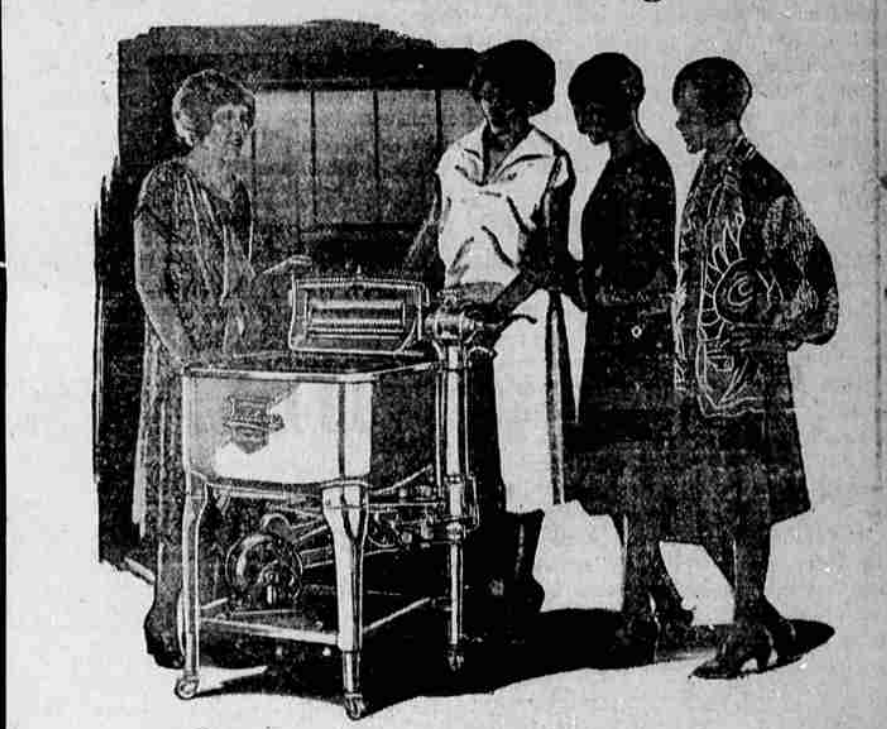
