RAY DODGE WILL QUIT CINDER PATH

Former O. S. C. Star to Abandon Track After I. A. C. Meet Friday

CHICAGO, Feb. 8 (AP)—Ray Dodge, former Oregon State college athlete and distance runner, who has done well by the Illinois athletic club colors he has carried for several years, will quit the track for business after the I. A. C. meet Friday night.

Dodge, in making the statement yesterday, coupled it with comment concerning his race against Otto Pelzer, of Germany, at the Millrose games in New York last week. Dodge laid his defeat by Pelzer to being allowed from the track. He lost to the German star by about six yards after being in front much of the distance.

The two men meet again Friday night in the I. A. C. games over the 1000 metre distance.

Dr. Pelzer who worked out yesterday over the Northwestern University track did not discuss Dodge's statement about being allowed from the track at the Millrose games. It was Dodge's contention that the German, in seeking the lead, crowded him from the boards. As a result, Dodge said he slipped on the tile infield and lost about 10 yards, or enough to have won the race.

WESTERN STARS ENTER OLYMPICS

Great Legion of Athletes to Help America Defend Its Title

SAN FRANCISCO (AP)—The greatest legion of athletes ever assembled on the western side of the Rockies is preparing to help America defend its track supremacy in the 1928 Olympic Games.

A trio of stars, all present or former Olympic champions and all from the same university—Southern California—head the list. They are Charles Paddock of Hollywood and Clarence ("Bud") Houser and Lee Barnes, both of Los Angeles.

Paddock, sharer of the world's record of 5.8 for the hundred-yard dash, won the 100-meters event and placed second in the 200-meters in the 1920 games. Houser and Barnes made their marks in the 1924 games, the former winning the discus throw and 16-pound shot put, and the latter winning the jump-off after lying for first place in the pole vault.

The western cohorts will be swelled by many youngsters who have sprung to fame in the past four years. Such performers include Charles Borah, Leighton Pyle and Kenneth Grumbles, all Southern California luminaries, and Emerson Spencer, member of last year's Stanford University I. C. A. A. A. championship team.

Borah is right at Paddock's heels for sprinting honors and has given that great speedster some of his hardest races during the past two years. In 1925 he ran away from an impressive field to capture the senior national A. A. U. 100-yard dash title.

Pyle and Grumbles won the 120-yard high and 220-yard low hurdles respectively in the 1926 national championships, while each holds the national record in his event.

A 440-yard lap finished in 1:47 4-5, two-fifths of a second slower than the record, that has stood for many years, elevated Spencer to prominence last year. He is expected to make a strong bid for honors in the 400-meter class.

Grumbles is expected to try for honors on the United States team in the 1000-yard race. He is coached by Eric Krenz, weight man, and Fred

Johnny Burns Defeats Negro In Snappy Tilt

PORTLAND, Feb. 8 (AP)—Johnny Burns, Oakland, Cal., flashed a dazzling repertoire of punches to win a 19-round decision over Walcott Langford, negro contender for the middleweight title. Langford, who absorbed much punishment never stopped and managed to connect with some sweeping left hooks to the head and slashing rights to the body. After going to the canvas in the first round for a short count, Langford finished strong in the tenth. It was a spectacular battle.

George Hval and Bobby Lamar, 140 pounders, staged an extraordinary preliminary. After five knockdowns in the third round, Lamar rose and hurled a sweeping right to the point of the jaw that sent Hval down for the count of seven. In the opinion of the referee he was out on his feet, and Lamar was awarded the decision.

Jimmy Dolan, Los Angeles welterweight, outpointed Tim Callahan in the six round semi-windup. George Ingersoll, Astoria took a six-round decision over Frankie Lewis, San Francisco, and Art Lemire won from Ted Blake, Portland heavy, by knock out in the first round.

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OREGON TEAM BARELY WINS OVER MONTANA

EUGENE, Ore., Feb. 8 (AP)—The University of Oregon, showing up in poor form for the most part, barely won from the University of Montana here last night in the final home conference basketball game of the season. The score was 26 to 23.

The tally at half time was 15 to 17 for Montana and the Grizzlies led for the greater part of the game.

Anderson Whips Dave Shade In 10-Round Fight

LOS ANGELES, Feb. 8 (AP)—Joe Anderson, Kentucky middleweight, reversed a previous defeat at the hands of Dave Shade when he won the decision over the Californian in a 10-round bout here last night. Anderson won rather decisively.

Ringsiders gave Anderson from five to six of the rounds.

The crouching Californian had only one round by any kind of a margin, it was the ninth. In the tenth he also gave Anderson somewhat of a beating, but the Kentucky fighter's early lead was too much for Shade to overcome.

The two met several months ago in New York with the San Francisco boxer turning back a rally in the late rounds to win over the Kentuckian.

Sun Still Good For 15 Trillion Years

WASHINGTON (AP)—The world needn't worry for 15,000,000,000 years about the sun falling to give forth its heat, in the opinion of Dr. Charles G. Abbot, noted astrophysicist and secretary of the Smithsonian Institution.

The sun is reducing in mass, but scientists estimate that it will take that long for it to be destroyed. Present belief, he explains, is that the sun and stars furnish their tremendous amount of energy through actual annihilation of the atoms of which they are composed.

Recent research, he said, has disclosed that the sun sends out an amount of energy which would equal, if translated into mechanical work, one horsepower a square yard over the surface of a sphere having a radius of 53,000,000 miles, its distance from the earth.
