## MENUS

**By Sister Mary**  
**BREAKFAST**—Chilled apple sauce, cereal cooked with dates, cream, cornmeal pancakes, sirup, milk, coffee.

**LUNCHEON**—Dried lima beans baked with bacon and tomatoes, brown bread, stuffed kumquat salad, ginger cookies, milk, tea.

**DINNER**—Braised lamb, baked potato marbles, head lettuce with Russian dressing, jellied oranges with whipped cream, coffee.

The braised lamb suggested in the dinner menu uses a cut from the fore-quarter in advantage. Fore-quarter meat is tougher than hind-quarter but careful cooking will break down the connective tissue which causes the trouble.

**Braised Lamb**  
 Two and one-half or three pounds lamb, 1 cup diced carrots, 1 cup diced turnip, 1/2 cup diced celery, 1 onion, 2 teaspoons salt, parsley.

Trim lamb, carefully removing all skin. Bridge with four and roast in a covered roaster until about half done. This will take about one hour. The meat should be evenly browned. Add vegetables, sprinkling them over the meat in alternating layers and pour in at one side of the pan one cup of boiling water. Cover and roast until the vegetables are done. Serve on a hot platter surrounded with vegetable and sprinkle with minced parsley.

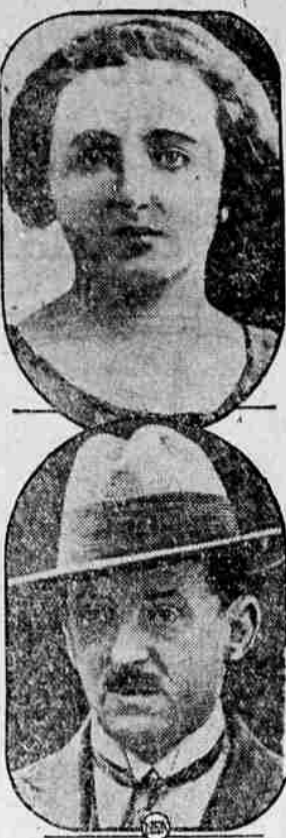
The onions should be cut in thin slices.

## THE GARDEN

**DESIGNING THE FLOWER GARDEN**  
 Design has become a most important factor in horticulture and upon design depends the appearance of the home surroundings. Whether they are artistic and appealing or whether commonplace and lacking in distinction. The flower garden should be carefully planned in its relation to the entire ground area of the home. It should be laid out to scale, the entire lot being drawn and decision made as to the location of the flower planting and what shape it shall take—whether it shall be a border around the boundaries of the yard, whether it shall be a formal garden or whether it shall consist of borders along the walks or drives.

The simplest and most effective plan for the average small home usually is a boundary planting with a background of shrubbery or vines. A border from six to ten feet wide, according to the dimensions of the lot, with colonies of plants selected as to color har-

mony and season of bloom. Small formal gardens to occupy the entire area of the small back yards have proved one of the most attractive plans. In this case the first decision is as to whether the lines shall be straight or curved. Straight-line beds and borders are the easiest to handle and keep in order. It is also a popular feature now to dig a small pool for the beauty of its reflections of surrounding foliage and also to grow a water lily to give its fine summer bloom.

The simplest and most lavish display of color may be secured by the use of annuals in these borders, especially if the dweller is a renter or if he is newly developing the property, the annuals furnishing color while a stock of perennials is being raised for permanent decoration. In no event plenty of annuals will be needed to furnish a midsummer and fall display when the perennial season yields. It is a wise plan to visit yards which have attracted admiration in your neighborhood during the winter and inspect the lines and general design with a view to adapting the best features for your own yard. In addition there are a number of excellent books on design for the home grounds at reasonable prices.

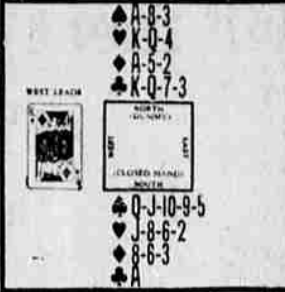
**SILK DRESSES POPULAR**

**WITHDRAW OLD MONEY**  
 VIENNA (AP)—Old Hungarian bank notes of 500,000 and 1,000,000 crowns denominations are being withdrawn from circulation in Hungary. They will cease to be legal tender in June of this year.

## Bridge Pointers

Yesterday I gave an Auction Bridge hand and asked how the Declarer should plan to play it when Dummy's hand was exposed. South is the Declarer; Spades the trump. The hand follows:—



The Declarer can see at first glance that he has as possible losers two Diamonds, one Spade and one Heart; should he lose those three tricks, he will fail to make game. He will not lose to the adverse Spade King if it be in the West hand, and he put South in with the Ace of Clubs and try the trump finesse on trick 3 (played in that way, with the finesse succeeding, he would make a Small Slam); but if he try that play and the King be in the East hand, the finesse will lose and game will go with it, as East & West then, in addition to the King of trumps, would win two Diamonds and the Ace of Hearts.

In order to take no chance of being game, Declarer should make an insurance play as follows: Trick 1—trick 3 with the Ace of Diamonds in Dummy. Trick 2, lead a small Club from Dummy, winning with the Ace in Closed Hand. Trick 3, lead the Queen of Spades from Closed Hand (trying to tempt West to play the King if he have it) but, whether West covers with the King or plays small, play the Ace of Spades from Dummy. Tricks 4 and 5, lead the King and Queen of Clubs from Dummy, discarding two losing Diamonds from Closed Hand. This will practically insure for Declarer every remaining trick but the King of Spades and the Ace of Hearts. It is quite true that a successful finesse of Spades would produce a Small Slam unless there is some freak division of the adverse cards; but a sure game is a bird in hand and far more important than an even chance for a Small Slam in the bush. **GIGANTIC STONE BRIDGE**  
 STUTTGART, Germany—A ninearch stone bridge, believed to be the largest of its kind in Europe, has been completed across Ravenna gorge in the Black Forest mountains near the station of Hoelsteig, Germany.
