Bowen field and said farewell to the Lone Eagle.
After thanking the president for his reception, the flier jumped in the winged "Spirit of St. Louis" and started for his last port of call on his good will flight.
Flying Conditions Ideal
Flying conditions were ideal when Lindbergh took off. At the time he left the field at 6 a. m., with General Russell and Mrs. Russell, he found 500 persons already there to see him start. He stowed a bag of official mail, half a dozen sandwiches and a canteen of water into the plane. Fifteen minutes later President Borno and his cabinet arrived. Lindbergh climbed out of the plane to say farewell.
Six planes of the marine squadron tuned up their engines as Lindbergh turned over the propeller of his famous craft. The first of the escort planes started down the field at 6:30. The last of the escort was off at 6:54.
Circles Over City
At 6:54 the "Spirit of St. Louis" circled the length of the field and halted while Lindbergh climbed out for a final check of the machine. He took off at 6:55.
Lindbergh circled over the city followed by the escort under Captain Presley. The escort flying in double V formation.
FRENCH MEN TAKE OFF (MONTGOMERY, Ala., Feb. 8 (AP)—Diondione Costes and Joseph Leblanc, French aviators of the air, hopped off from Maxwell field for Washington at 8:19 o'clock this morning. An escort of four planes from the local field accompanied the aviators 100 miles. Weather conditions for the course were reported good.

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Navy Planes Stop At Roseburg, Ore.
ROSEBURG, Ore., Feb. 8 (AP)—A low ceiling is today delaying the departure of three navy planes that were forced down here last night because of inability to get over the divide between Roseburg and Grants Pass. The planes were built in Seattle at the Boeing factory and are being taken to the naval air station at San Diego by Lieutenants D. C. Allen, W. V. Davis, Jr., and H. V. Hopkins. Lieut. Davis was co-pilot and navigator with Arthur Goebel on the Dole flight from San Francisco to Honolulu. The ships are to be used on the plane carrier Saratoga in the Pacific fleet maneuvers.
They passed over Roseburg late yesterday afternoon but were turned back at Canyonville when they ran into a storm which appeared to extend for considerable distance south, running up to such an elevation that it was deemed unsafe to try to get through, particularly as the planes were beginning to run low on gas.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 8 (AP)—A new major general of the national guard will be appointed with creation of the 41st Division which takes in units from Montana, Oregon, Idaho, Washington, and Wyoming.
A war department announcement today said that state authorities were now considering the location for the division's headquarters and the governor of the state to which it is assigned would have jurisdiction over the appointment of the division commander although the officer will be required to secure federal recognition of his commission subsequently.

Improvement of the Columbia river, Washington, with a view to securing an adequate channel to the town of Ilwaco.

BIG ORCHARD SOLD
MEDFORD, Ore., Feb. 8 (AP)—The Medford Orchard, 15 miles east of this city, consisting of 540 acres of pear and apples trees just coming into production, was sold today through E. T. Newby, trustee in bankruptcy to J. E. Edmiston and W. F. Hiddle, local orchardists. The price was said to be in the neighborhood of \$85,000.

PORTLAND, Ore., Feb. 8 (AP)—Emery Olmstead, former president of the Northwestern National bank, resumed the witness stand today for cross examination in his trial in which he is jointly charged with J. E. Wheeler, former president of the McCormick Lumber company, with conspiracy to violate the national banking act. Olmstead was unfringed under the fire of District Attorney George Seiner, who went over testimony Olmstead had given concerning checks which Wheeler had deposited in the Northwestern National bank and which had been returned by eastern banks.
