## HEALTH

### THE TONSILS OF CHILDHOOD

The general health, physical development, and to a certain extent even the mental development of a growing child is vitally influenced by the condition of the tonsils and to the extent they may have become infected or germ-laden by previous illness common to early childhood. Repeated attacks of tonsillitis, various inflammatory conditions of the throat or its surrounding tissues, frequent colds, especially those of the mild influenza type, all leave the tonsils more or less enlarged and in a diseased condition. This is particularly true after attacks of the various eruptive fevers such as measles, chickenpox, scarlet fever, etc., which predispose the child to other serious diseases of an acute or chronic type.

During the earlier months of infancy, the child is usually well protected from the common sources of infection and too close association with other people, but sooner or later, with change or environment it acquires one or more of the so-called children's diseases to which all children are exposed.

Almost every known disease germ including that of tuberculosis, has been found to exist on the surface of the tonsil or imbedded within its tissues, and from chronically infected tonsils of this type many diseases of a local or general nature may have their beginning.

Repeated attacks of tonsillitis, with its frequent complications affecting other parts of the throat, the ears, nose, sinuses, and glands of the neck, may also be the commencement of bronchitis, pneumonia, rheumatism, St. Vitus' Dance, heart disease, and even various forms of kidney troubles.

Nevertheless, the tonsils have a definite function to perform, and during the first two years of life are not by any means useless appendages. During this time particularly they form an effective barrier against disease and ward off infections to the infant's bronchial tubes, lungs, and deeper structures of the body. They are supposed to produce an internal secretion of their own which undoubtedly assists in this protection.

When should a child's tonsils, therefore, be considered sufficiently diseased to warrant removal, and what is the earliest age this may be done? These questions must be decided in each individual case. Authorities differ somewhat as to the ages of two and four years, though removal of the tonsils is advised.
