GODFREY TO GET REAL FIST TEST

Giant Negro Will Meet Paulino Uzcudun in Los Angeles on Feb. 28

 NEW YORK (AP)—Paulino Uzcudun, the Pounding Barque who ended the myth of Harry Wills' invincibility with a few well-directed blows of a club-like right, has started out to do as much for Godfrey's successor as the Dark Menace of the heavy-weight ring.

If there is a color line, Paulino never heard of it, and in Los Angeles, February 28, he takes on the current Negro standard-bearer—George Godfrey—in a ten-round decision bout.

In preparation for this coming test of his prowess as a menace-maker, Paulino has peppered his path with knockouts. His last three bouts have had "knocky" endings and the golden-toothed Spaniard makes his first invasion of California in somewhat confident and benignant mood.

The Basque undoubtedly is up against a considerably harder proposition in Godfrey than he was in his last three fights, however. This dusky panther from Leiperville, Pa., looms as much more formidable than Pat Lester, Ed Keeley or even Quentín Romero Rojas, all of whom Paulino added to his knockout list last month.

Except for a 1926 bout with Jack Sharkey which he lost, Godfrey has not met any of the leading white heavy-weight contenders, but he has a fairly impressive record featured by a one-round knockout of Jim Maloney.

The giant Negro will have a big advantage over Paulino in size. Weighing 225 pounds and towering six feet, two inches high, he is 25 pounds heavier and three inches taller than the Basque.

Paulino, while rarely spectacular, has lost but two bouts of the 12 he has fought in this hemisphere and one of those—that to Jack Delaney—was on a somewhat questionable foul. The other was a decision to Johnny Risko.

Incidentally the Godfrey fight will be the thirtieth of Paulino's invasion, but the six number means nothing to him.

Except for a scrap with Homer Smith in Florida, the Romero Rojas bout last month in Mexico City, and two warm-up fights in Havana at the start of the American tour more than a year ago, all of Paulino's fights in this part of the world have been fought in New York or vicinity.
