## HEALTH

### PAIN—HUMANITY'S MOST FREQUENT COMPLAINT, A SYMPTOM THAT SOMETHING IS WRONG

Pain, the most frequent and universal complaint of humanity, is but a symptom, the cause of which may be quite remote from the area involved. It may be sharp, dull, severe, mild, lancinating, shooting, darting, gripping, colicky, interrupted, or continuous.

In any region of the body pain is a signal or cry for relief from some insult to a nerve, caused by infection or pressure from injury or disease in the surrounding structures.

Pain in the head is commonly due to eye strain, anemia, nephritis, errors in diet, blood disease, sinus or brain infection, tumor, or hemorrhage.

Pain in the throat suggests some form of infection in the pharynx, tonsils, or larynx. Pain in the ear may be the warning of an abscess of the external or middle ear, infection of the mastoid cells, or transmitted, toxically from the throat.

Pain in the chest is occasioned by lung infection, pleurisy, intercostal neuralgia, and angina pectoris, hardening of the blood vessels of the heart.

Pain in the abdomen, always a danger signal, may be caused by appendicitis, gall bladder, ulcer of the stomach or intestine, a diseased pancreas, spleen, or hernia. Pain in the stomach or intestines is the most frequent ailment complained of by man, woman, and child. It is commonly considered an attack of indigestion or due to constipation.

The popular, yet erroneous treatment consists of cathartics and emetics. Food is allowed and the patient permitted to be about. This error has caused many deaths from appendicitis, intestinal or stomach perforations, obstructions, or peritonitis. Competent medical advice should be sought at once. No self medication or food allowed, and the patient should be kept quiet in bed.

Pain in a nerve, known as neuritis or neuralgia, referred to lightly and subjected to ordinary remedies for relief, demands careful investigation. A tumor or constitutional disease may be the exciting cause.

Pain in the muscle or joint, generally referred to as rheumatic, is due to infection from teeth, tonsils, or other focal areas. The source should be sought and removed at the earliest moment. Pain in a bone or joint, if due to infection or injury, should be given immediate medical attention. Neglect or delay might result in permanent deformity or death.

Pain in the lower limbs and feet is not infrequently caused by broken or relaxed arches, ill fitting shoes, faulty posture in walking or standing, also lowered vitality and resistance. Pain in the back, frequently referred to as lumbago, may be due to diseased kidneys, inflamed pelvic joints, spinal or pelvic disease. Frequent physical examinations will detect early the cause of pain. By observing the warning signals of pain, the patient will avert much suffering, reduce the amount of sickness, and increase the life span.

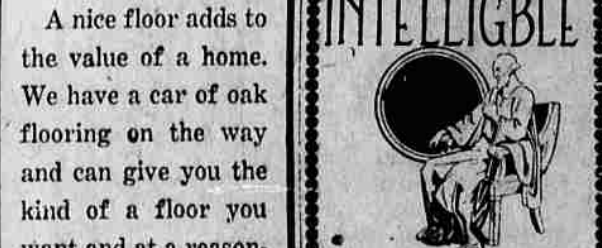
