Beacon Lights Molested; Hoover Issues Warning

Visitors, young or old, at the beacon lights which are now being installed at various points in the county, are to keep off the tower and leave surrounding equipment alone. This was the request of A. I. Hoover, always inspector for the government, with headquarters in Boise, who is here supervising the installation of the towers. Not only to prevent damage or destruction to the tower but to prevent accidents to the visitors, has Mr. Hoover made this request.

Already, some persons, supposedly boys, have torn up stakes which were set up by surveyors for installing the lights, and have used them apparently for building fires, either maliciously or carelessly, said Mr. Hoover. "It is a matter of considerable expense and effort for us to have to do this work over and we are sure that if you realize this they won't destroy the equipment around the towers, either maliciously or carelessly," said Mr. Hoover today. He also warned children, hiking in the hills, from trying to climb up the tower.

Mr. Hoover reports that work on the towers is progressing very well. The main revolving beacons have 1,000 watt bulbs with three million candle power, he said, and the two smaller ones 100 watt bulbs at either side, for directing aviators to fields, have 500 watt bulbs. The towers now are ready for the electricians to begin work upon, he stated.

400 Fishermen Are In Grave Danger

LENNINGRAD, Feb. 11 (AP)—
Fear is felt for the fate of 400 fishermen carried out to sea last night on an ice block which became detached from the shore 40 miles from Leningrad during a heavy storm that swept the Finnish bay.

PORTLAND, Ore., Feb. 11 (AP)—
J. G. Gilliam, receiver for the bankrupt Overbeck and Cooke brokerage company here, said today that Logan and Bryan, men who were arrested last night on charges of stealing from the company, had been released. Gilliam said the company is under moral obligations to make good the Overbeck and Cooke deficit to creditors. The loss will amount to more than one million dollars, the receivers of the bankrupt company said.

Bill Never Reached Floor

Legislatively, Lincoln's two main distinctions were his bill to abolish slavery in the District of Columbia and his opposition to the Mexican war. However, the bill couldn't be forced onto the floor. The Lincoln lived at a boarding house near the Capitol, along with several other congressmen. Dr. Samuel C. Husey, who sat nearly opposite Lincoln at the table, wrote:

"I soon learned to know and admire him for his simple and unostentatious manners, kindness and amusing jokes, anecdotes and witticisms. When about to tell an anecdote during a meal he would lay down his knife and fork, place his elbows on the table, rest his face between his hands and begin with the words, 'that reminds me.' Everybody prepared for the explosions sure to follow. I recall with vivid pleasure the scene of merriment at the dinner after his speech in the House of Representatives, occasioned by the descriptions, by himself and others of the Congressional mess of the uproar in the House during his delivery."

One Washingtonian used to tell how, when Lincoln borrowed some law books from the Library of Congress, he wrapped them in a bandanna handkerchief and ran a stick through a knot in the handkerchief, carrying them away on his shoulder.

No Military Aspirations
Allen C. Clark, a Washington lawyer who has studied Lincoln's life here, supposes that Husey meant the speech Lincoln delivered in July, 1848, against the presidential aspirations of General Cass.

In this speech, during which he ridiculed the general's pretensions to a military career, Lincoln expressed the hope that if the opposition Democratic party ever made him a presidential candidate, they would "not make fun of me, as they have of General Cass, by attempting to write me into a military hero." Probably no one, including Lincoln, had the slightest idea that he would ever run for the presidency.

Bridge Pointers

This is the 12th Saturday auction bridge article written for the novice. It starts a description of scoring, and after that has been fully explained, the series will shift to the bidding of hands.

The Game of Auction Bridge

Chapter 12.
Everything connected with the mechanics of the game has been described in previous articles, except the scoring; and that is our subject for today.

Arbitrary values per trick are given to the different suits: Spades 9, Hearts 8, Diamonds 7, Clubs 6 and No Trump 10. The Declarer's side alone counts tricks for game. Both sides count for honors and slams. The adversaries alone count for defeating the contract, and the Declarer's side counts a bonus for making a doubled contract. On prepared score sheets a horizontal line is always printed, and on informal score sheets, it should be drawn. Under this line, trick scores are entered and above it all other scores are entered. A game is 30 points made with trick scores only. For trick-scores, the number of tricks over the book (or in other words over six) count, provided the amount of the contract—whatever it may be—has been fulfilled. If a Declarer bid one No Trump and made seven tricks (one over his book), he would fulfill his contract and count 10 (the value of one No Trump) on his trick score. If he made more than one he would count 10 on his trick score for each "odd" trick he made; but if he bid two No Trumps and made one, he would not count anything on his trick score because he failed to make his contract.

When a contract is doubled and

made, the Declarer counts on his trick score the amount that he makes at its doubled value. For example, should "two Hearts" be doubled and four-odd (ten tricks) be made, the Declarer would count 16 (twice 8) for each trick, or a total of 64. When a contract is redoubled and made, the Declarer counts four times the value of each odd trick won. Five Clubs redoubled and six odd (12 tricks) won, would count 144. In each of these cases Declarer would score above the line a bonus for making a doubled contract; the way in which that is counted will be explained next week.

Game (30 trick points) can be made in one or more hands when playing the standard rubber game. If South should bid and make one No Trump on the first hand, on the second hand West should make a score which totaled less than 30 for tricks, on the third hand South should fail to make his contract, and on the fourth hand North should bid one Spade and make three. North and South's trick totals of 10 for the first hand and 27 for the fourth would be added together, and as they would aggregate 37, the game being 30, they would then have won their game. When playing Duplicate or Progressive a different rule prevails; game (30 points or more) must be made in one hand if the game bonus is to be counted. But when playing rubber, a game continues until 30 points is made by one side or the other, it not mattering how many hands it takes for either side to accumulate that total. (Copyright, John E.
