Bridge Pointers

Continuing today our series of illustrations of the manner in which a Declarer at Auction or Contract Bridge should plan how to play his twenty-six cards as soon as the hand of the Dummy appears, we will consider the following situation. South is Declarer, playing a No Trump contract.



WEST LEADS

♠ A-J-9-7
♥ 8-4
♦ J-10-9-6
♣ A-5-2

EAST LEADS

♠ K-10
♥ A-10-3
♦ A-K-7
♣ K-J-10-9-8

As soon as Declarer sees the Dummy he should appreciate that his only danger of losing the game lies in having the Hearts established and run against him.

At the start he cannot tell whether the leader has opened a five-card or four-card suit. West has three Hearts higher than the Five, but the division of the adverse Hearts may be West five, East three, or four in each adverse hand. If West have the Deuce, East has only three Hearts. If East has the Deuce, the adverse eight Hearts are evenly divided.

It is quite true that the Declarer could win the first Heart and, if the finesse in Spades, Diamonds and Clubs all worked perfectly, could make a Grand Slam; but the odds against catching all three Queens are very great, and game should not be sacrificed chasing such a will-o'-the-wisp. Declarer should plan to hold up the Hearts until third round, thus exhausting East. If the adverse Hearts be dangerous (that is, if West have five), next try the Club finesse which can be taken either way but should be so taken that, if it loses, East will be the adversary who wins the trick. Should East win with the Queen of Clubs and have a fourth Heart, Declarer would discard a Diamond from Closed Hand and make the rest of the tricks (three-odd). If the Club finesse win or if, when it loses, East has not a fourth Heart, the game is easier still. If the Club finesse lose and East lead a Diamond, the
