The \$2500 which this year's budget calls for goes toward taking care of the leadership and training of the boy scouts enrolled in La Grande, the salary of a trained executive employed to develop efficient and permanent boy scout troops, supplies and other necessary things for the success of scouting. Under the plan used in smaller cities and towns are given the same high-type scouting as in the larger cities of the United States.

Several facts concerning scouting will be given out by the committee when they begin their campaign tomorrow—that it costs more to reform 30 boys in state institutions than it costs to maintain more than 600 boys in the boy scout character building program, that the boy scouts when properly organized in any community render many hours of free public service to organizations and civic affairs throughout the year, that the scouts help everybody, church, home and school and that more than 800,000 scouts in the United States are healthy, robust, mentally awake, physically strong and morally straight.

Court Is Hearing Trial of Mayville

The case of the state of Oregon against A. N. Mayville is being heard today before Circuit Judge J. W. Knowles after a several days' adjournment of court which included Monday, a legal holiday. The state charges Dr. Mayville with practicing medicine without a license.

They laughed at him, the sheriff's office was informed, and continued firing at bottles and tables. Again the aged pioneer issued a sharp command and again the boys laughed.

Suddenly the grizzled veteran who had been in Lake county since 1865 leveled his revolver at Porter and fired. The shot was effective but the bullet went true, however, and struck Porter on the breast inflicting a black and blue mark on the chest, authorities said.

Then, authorities said, one of the two men leveled his revolver at the old man. The revolver cracked and a bullet pierced the old man's mouth, ranged down and came out in the back of the neck. He fell seriously wounded.

Today these two young men are behind the bars of the Lakeview jail. The fun of Sunday's spree is but a wild dream, and they are now faced with prosecution by the state.

Work Speaks—
Federal irrigation is now on a safe footing, Secretary Work told the conference today.

He explained that federal engineers had made a splendid job of getting water to dry land, but that nothing was done to solve further economic problems of settlement, development, marketing and cooperation among the settlers.

"The settlers became repudiators from necessity," he added, "for they could not pay for their farms. But now irrigation is a going concern, the old idea of repudiation has disappeared. The farmers want to own their homes eventually and we have shown them that they can."

Progress Shown In 1927 In M. E. Annual Report

CHICAGO, Feb. 14 (AP)—Marked progress during 1927 in the activities of the Methodist homes and deaconess work board of the Methodist Episcopal church was shown in the annual report of the secretary, L. N. E. Davis, today.

The report told of the dedication of St. Luke's hospital, Cleveland, erected at a cost of \$5,000,000; the gift of \$2,500,000 to Christ hospital, Cincinnati for a new building and nurses' home; and of \$1,000,000 for a medical research laboratory; a gift of \$750,000 to the Methodist children's home at Detroit; and the establishment of the Palmer hospital for cancer research at Boston.

"The total property valuation and endowment for all hospitals and homes in the United States represents \$75,000,000, an increase of \$36,000,000 since 1920," the report said.

Mutiny Reported In Northern Ranks

PEKING, Feb. 14 (AP)—Reports were received in Peking today of a mutiny within the ranks of the northern alliance, the mutiny being stamped out.

Mukden, Manchuria, Marshal Chang Tso-Lin, the northern dictator, after a three hour battle.

The fight was said to have taken place at Potowchen on the Tsinjin railway north of Tachow. The "Chili" troops had been mutinously inclined because of their non-payment for many months and the Mukden forces were ordered to disarm them. A battle followed. The Potowchen station was said to be littered with dead and dying.

Five Senators On Oil Trial Stand

WASHINGTON, Feb. 14 (AP)—Five United States senators, Shortridge, California; Watson, Indiana; Moses, New Hampshire; Copeland and Wagner, New York, stood on the witness stand today in the criminal contempt proceedings against Harry F. Sinclair, William J. Burns and their associates as character witnesses for Burns.

The senators said they had known the famous detective for from 10 years to a quarter of a century and that his reputation for honesty and integrity throughout the country was good.

LINDBERGH SAYS AIR SERVICE TO SOUTH FEASIBLE

Lindbergh said the last non-stop leg of the flight through the fog was like any other flight and that he was not lost at any time.

"My longest jump over the water was between Havana and Key West about 100 miles," he related. "Then from Key West to Florida I think it was nearly the same distance. I skirted the coast of Florida north and flew directly toward St. Louis. It was from then on that I had to detour though I encountered fog from the time I hit the mainland."

"I was only occasionally out of sight of the ground on the trip yesterday. The flying ceiling was too low to circle over St. Louis as I had planned and so I headed directly for the field. The mouth of the Missouri river was a landmark for me."

Lindbergh said he had enjoyed the trip, although the flying was done in the worst weather possible according to the weather bureau.

The flier added to be allowed to retire early to get some rest for the flight which has been planned today as a tribute to the school children of St. Louis. The program called for a flight by Col. Lindbergh over the Mississippi river between the Eads and the free bridges with the children lined up along the levee.

State Building Is Given Approval

SALEM, Ore., Feb. 14 (AP)—A new office building for the state of Oregon to house state departments was given approval by the state supreme court today.

The supreme court opinion written by Justice Rossman, reversing Judge L. H. McMahan of the lower court for Marion county, who held that \$600,000 of the state industrial accident commission funds could not legally be loaned for construction of the building. Also the opinion which was on rehearing went contrary to a former supreme court opinion written by Justice Brown, who affirmed the McMahan decree, holding that the diversion of funds would violate the constitutional prohibition against the state going into debt in excess of \$50,000.

Preventives Are Needed Against Decay of Tooth

CHICAGO, Feb. 14 (AP)—Detective Sergeant Thomas Cooper, quick on the draw and of deadly aim, failed to "stick 'em up" in answer to a bandit quartet's commands last night and when the smoke cleared away one robber lay dead, two were wounded and mortally, while the fourth had fled.

The shooting took place in a southside restaurant where the sergeant had stopped for lunch. While hanging up his hat and coat, the four men seized Miss Blanche Wilson, proprietor, by the throat.

As she screamed, Sergeant Cooper wheeled around, drawing his pistol. The bandit leader dropped to the floor at the first shot. Two others, unarmed, attempted to rush the policeman, but they too fell. The fourth man ran.

Private Liquor Is Immune, Court Says

SAN FRANCISCO, Feb. 14 (AP)—Private stocks of liquor are immune from seizure by prohibition agents unless such seizure is legally predicated upon evidence of sale or unless there is proof that it is "being used in the commission of a crime."

Such was the ruling of the United States circuit of appeals here yesterday in ordering the return of liquor seized by federal prohibition agents in a raid at the home of Thomas Fabri of San Francisco.
