Trading Quiet; Receipts Eggs, Butter Heavy

PORTLAND, Ore., Feb. 15 (AP)—
Trading on local wholesale mar-
kets was rather quiet today, with
prices for the most part steady at
yesterday's quotations. Butter and
eggs were firm with no changes
in prices.

Receipts of both butter and eggs
were heavy, but demand was suf-
ficient to absorb all offerings at
ruling prices.

Butter was firm today with the
market well cleaned up on most
classes. Storage holdings are for
the most part small except for fur-
kers, of which a few have been
accumulating during the past week
or so. Demand for ducks and
geese is lighter, but receipts have
also been light, so prices have held
steady.

Country dressed meats were
firm with receipts of veal and home-
reported light. Beef continues
draggish with demand slow.
Potatoes and onions are steady,
with a firm undercurrent reported as
a result of slightly better condi-
tions in eastern markets. Prices
are not appreciably higher, how-
ever, and demand is light.

Trading Active In Specialties In Wall Street

NEW YORK, Feb. 15 (AP)—
Trading in today's stock market
was largely a specialty affair with
standard industrials and rails mov-
ing within rather narrow and in-
regular limits. Pools succeeded in
marking up about a dozen issues
to new high records and a few soft
spots were uncovered by bears.
Trading was in moderate volume,
although a few large blocks changed
hands in the early part of the
session.

Renewal of call money at 4 1/2
per cent tended to check bullish
operations although there was lit-
tle calling of bank loans.

The closing was irregular. Con-
structive interests turned to pub-
lic utilities and merchandising
shares in the late trading to off-
set the effect of a 5-point drop
in Freeport-Texas and further li-
quidation of oils which sank to
new low levels. Montana Power,
Peoples Gas, Brooklyn Edison and
Mallinson company improved 2 to
3 points and General Motors and
T. S. Steel were marked up to
127 1/2 and 145, respectively. Hupp
Motors crossed 29 on large deal-
ings. Total sales approximated
1,900,000 shares.

Wheat Slightly Off At Closing

CHICAGO, Feb. 15 (AP)—Open-
ing unchanged to 1/2 off, corn un-
changed, a moderate setback all
around. Wheat started unchanged
to 1/2 lower, and subsequently
showed a general drop. Oats were
easy. Provisions also tended to
fall.

Corn closed firm, 1/2 to 1 1/2 c
higher, wheat 1/2 to 1/4 c off, oats
at a shade decline to 1/2 c ad-
vance and provisions varying from
1/2 c decline to an equal gain.

REHIN, Feb. 15 (AP)—Twenty-
five cents worth of material and
ten minutes of time are all that are
necessary to make the brakes on
the new Ford automobile conform
to German law. Herr Heine, man-
ager of the local Ford company, de-
clared Monday. The new Ford sys-
tem of working hand and foot
brakes with the same mechanism is
a violation of the German safety
regulation prescribing a distinct
mechanism for each brake. For
this reason the latest Ford prod-
uct was refused a license to op-
erate.
