

Wallowa Gets 4 Inches of Snow; Livestock Okeh

WALLOWA, Ore., Feb. 15. (Special)—A fall of three or four inches of dry snow occurred in this county Monday night, and while the sun is quite warm during a part of the day, a cold wind continues to blow most of the time. Nothing can be ascertained yet regarding the condition of winter wheat crops of this county, but the majority of the fields have been covered with a blanket of snow during the most of the winter. Freezing earlier in the winter is said to have caused a noticeable heaving of the ground, but whether this condition will prove damaging to the crops, can not be told.

Feeding conditions have been excellent during the past few weeks with reports telling of most of the

livestock coming along in very good condition. About the same quantity of feed is being required at this time as that of December and January. Some bands of horses are being put through without much additional feed due to the use of hunch-grass in some of the pastures in the hills.

Some scattering lambing is being done on a few of the farms at this time, while some of the larger bands will not start until about the first of March. A few who have lambled out small flocks recently report fairly good success in saving the lambs.

Fatal Accident At Wallowa Co. Logging Camp

WALLOWA, Ore., Feb. 15. (Special)—A second fatal accident in logging camps in this county, occurred Feb. 10 when Charles M. Markindale, a foreman at the Clark's camp, in Wallowa canyon, was struck by a log while engaged in helping clear out a log jam at the Bowman-Hicks Lumber company logging site there. The log came upon the workers unexpectedly while they were at work and he was unable to get out of the way. Mr. Markindale with his family came here from Arkansas about three years ago, and for some time was working for the company in the Maxwell section. A few months ago he was transferred to the camp in the canyon. He was born Nov. 3, 1881 being 46 years of age at the time of his death. He is survived by a widow and six children.

Well Known Lawyer Is Shot to Death

LOS ANGELES, Feb. 16 (AP)—Ray V. McGraw, well known Los Angeles corporation attorney, and formerly of Omaha, Neb., was found shot to death in his law office in a downtown building here last night. A new shotgun and the box in which it apparently had been purchased were found beside the body of the dead man. Detectives expressed the opinion that McGraw had committed suicide but started an investigation at the instigation of friends and relatives.
