KANSAS CITY, Feb. 17 (AP)—Mrs. Mary De Jaynes, 23, had a chance for life today—a chance afforded by the blood of an unidentified man, one of several who responded to a radio appeal for blood to save her life.

14 KILLED WHEN TANKER EXPLODES

American Ship Chuky Is Blown Up Off Tokyo—21 of Crew Rescued

TOKYO, Feb. 17 (AP)—The captain and 12 members of the crew of the American oil tanker Chuky were killed when the vessel exploded.

A tanker arrived here today with the 21 survivors of the disaster which occurred Wednesday as the tanker was en route from San Pedro, Cal., to Japan.

Several of the survivors, who were landed, were injured.

SAN PEDRO, Feb. 17 (AP)—The oil tanker Chuky left here Jan. 19 for Tsurumi, Japan. At that time she was listed as being operated by the Chile Steamship company of New York. She is registered under the ownership of the Sheridan S. S. Co. of London.

The Chuky was a vessel of 7,335 gross tons, built in Glasgow in 1922. The size of her crew is not known here.

LONDON, Feb. 17 (AP)—A Lloyd's dispatch from Yokohama says the tanker Chuky was blown up and sank at the approximate position of 33 north longitude, 140 east longitude, or more than 150 miles south of Tokyo.

Fifteen of the crew were killed. Twenty-one other members of the crew were saved by fishermen and landed at Misaka, Japan.

Height of Projection Twists Movie Scenes, Camera Expert Declares

HOLLYWOOD (AP)—Most motion pictures are out of joint when an audience sees them, but not because they were badly made. Faulty projection, says Karl Struss in a paper submitted to the academy of motion picture arts and sciences is to blame.

Struss, who handled the camera in the latest productions of D. W. Griffith and F. W. Murnau and is known in the industry for his skill in achieving pictorial effects, contends that projecting a picture downward upon the screen from a projection room, perched near the roof of the theater cheats the spectators out of seeing the film they came to see.

What they really see, he says, is a greatly distorted image which under no condition or position in the theater can be seen normally.

Projecting downward at an angle, often as great as 45 degrees, transforms into a square the scene which appears on the film itself as a rectangle, Struss explains, and this distortion is carried into the image of players and sets. Spectators in the side seats often get a grotesquely distorted picture, but even those in the center of the house are not getting the picture as actually photographed.

As a remedy Struss proposes the installation of a periscope tube connecting the projection room with a point just beneath the balcony. This picture thus would be reflected downward through the balcony and then forward onto the screen at an angle eliminating all distortion.

"Or better still," he adds, "build the theater in the first place so as to put the projection room where it belongs; that is, at right angles to a vertical screen."

If prosecutors could fix the blame for that malicious move and uncover the truth, there would be more criminal convictions.

MERCHANDISING BY MAIL

"Congress and the Postoffice Department have established all sorts of postal regulations to protect the sender of mail. There should be some sort of protection afforded the recipient in the matter of unsolicited merchandising." This is one of many favorable comments on the efforts made by Congressman Watson of Pennsylvania to outlaw the practice referred to.

It started in a small and innocent way, but has grown to large and annoying proportions. The country is flooded with articles of clothing or office equipment, jewelry, traveling bags and conveniences and inconveniences of many sorts, sent by mail on the sender's own responsibility, burdening the recipient with the responsibility of paying for them or sending them back.

Sometimes the receiver really wants the stuff. Usually he doesn't. Often he finds it less troublesome to accept it and pay for it than to remail it. Nearly always he resents this kind of merchandising, because it takes an unfair advantage of him. If he neglects to do anything about it, he is likely to receive dunning letters, which may end by threatening forced collection or prosecution.

Few persons know that they are under no legal obligation either to return or pay for goods not ordered by them unless they have accepted and used the goods. It might be well, therefore, to afford the public blanket protection from such annoyance by legislative action. If it were made a crime for a business firm to mail anything not previously ordered in good faith, a long-suffering public would be benefited even though postal receipts were curtailed somewhat.
