Finding of Mummified Men Reveals Battle That Occurred in 2000 B. C.

NEW YORK, Feb. 17 (AP)—The story of a battle on the river Nile 4000 years ago as revealed by the mummified bodies of 60 soldiers, found buried in a royal tomb, is told in a bulletin of the Metropolitan Museum of art.

Dr. H. E. Winterset, associate curator of Egyptian art at the museum, reconstructs the battle from reports of the wounds found on the mummies by the museum's Egyptian expedition.

From the small head wounds and the downward course of arrows found in the bodies, Dr. Winterset says the men must have died storming a castle, the head wounds evidently having been caused by small missiles thrown from above. They were soldiers of King Menphothep and the unusual number paid them of burial in a royal tomb led to the conclusion they fell in an important engagement.

Other wounds on the bodies, the article says, shows that the wounded were dispatched with clubs by the victors after the comrades had retreated. Another attack, however, must have been successful as the bodies were recovered for burial.

The tomb in which the bodies were found were discovered in 1922 but because of the disorder showing the previous visits of thieves it was sealed and not opened until recently.

Marks of the linen of the soldiers showed their period to be that of 2000 B. C., an important find as excavators had previously failed to discover what manner of men were the invaders who descended on Egypt from Thebes. In 2000 B. C., conquered Memphis and started the second great period of Egyptian culture.

Sandino And U. S. Considering Peace
MANAGUA, Nicaragua, Feb. 17 (AP)—Communications said to deal with terms of peace have been exchanged between Augustin Sandino, rebel leader, and Rear Admiral David S. Sellers, commander of the U. S. squadron who arrived at Corinto yesterday.

Letters said to include peace terms written by Admiral Sellers for Sandino and dropped by airplane over Sandino's positions were received by the rebel chief. Sandino replied to the letters giving the terms under which he would lay down his arms but the terms have not been given out. Admiral Sellers arrived at Managua today from Corinto for a conference with Charles E. Eberhardt, American minister in Nicaragua and Brig. Gen. Logan Feland commanding the American machine forces here.

Three Candidates Breakfast Guests
WASHINGTON, Feb. 17 (AP)—Three avowed presidential candidates were among the group of senators at a White House breakfast this morning.

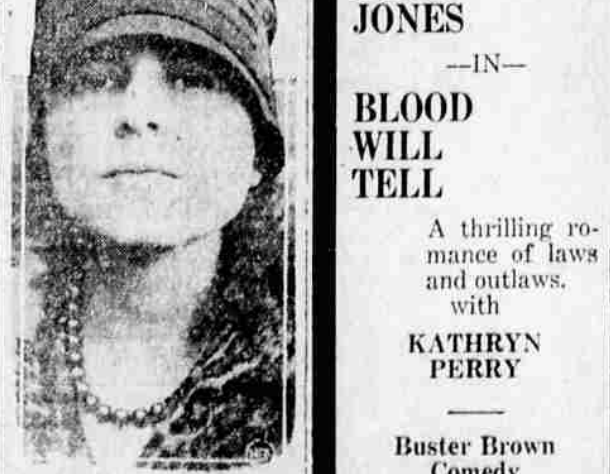

DAYTONA BEACH, Fla., Feb. 17 (AP)—Captain Malcolm Campbell, of England, driving his bluebird special was timed unofficially at 132.9245 miles an hour in a preliminary test today in preparation for an attempt to break the automobile speed record of 204.7 miles an hour. He announced that he expects to equal the record breaking run tomorrow.

GOV. JACKSON IS FREED BY JURY

Indiana Chief Executive Resumes Duties in the State House Today

INDIANAPOLIS, Ind., Feb. 17 (AP)—Ed Jackson, unseated today resumed his duties as governor.

He was acquitted yesterday of the charge that he concealed an attempt to impeach the former Gov. James E. McClary in 1923 to name James E. McDonald as Marion county prosecutor. A jury returned a directed verdict of not guilty. Special Judge Charles M. McCabe ordered the acquittal when he sustained a defense motion which contended the state failed to prove that Jackson, Robert L. Marsh, local attorney, and George V. Coffin, Marion county republican chairman had concealed the alleged bribery by keeping McCray, then governor in fear. The statute of limitations of two years, therefore, applied in the case. The indictment was returned last fall.

Over His Protest
It was over Gov. Jackson's protest that his attorney filed the motion for acquittal. The governor said he wanted to put his witnesses on the stand to refute statements of prosecution witnesses including former Gov. McCray that he personally had put the alleged bribe before McCray. In a statement the attorney said Jackson was prevailed upon to do their bidding because of Coffin and Marsh who are scheduled to be tried later.

The governor, however, will make public his evidence as soon as the Marsh and Coffin cases have been disposed of, the statement said. Defense attorneys believed the Jackson evidence "will convince fair minded persons that the charge of any wrong doing or criminal act on his part is wholly without foundation in fact."

Prosecutor Wm. H. Remy said he was not prepared to say whether the state would appeal the grand jury's decision or what would be done with the cases of Marsh and Coffin.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 17 (AP)—The assertion that there seemed to be "not only lying but forgery" in connection with documents offered a senate judiciary subcommittee holding hearings on the Baker's cabinet decrees was made today by Senator Borah, republican of Idaho, after examination of two letters from Abraham P. Myers, a member of the federal trade commission.

The senator's statement was made after Federal Judge Morris A. Soper, of Baltimore, had produced before a senate judiciary subcommittee the original of a letter from Myers, which differed from one which the former assistant attorney general had presented in the consent decree entered in the Ward Food Products corporation case.

Myers was not present at the hearing of Judge Soper but it was announced that he would be called before the subcommittee later.
