Pola Negri's intriguing screen romance which will be seen at the Star Theater Sunday and Monday.

Something of a parallel could be drawn between the loveless fate that befell Captain Miles Standish when he sent John Alden to do his courting for him, and the situation that develops in Miss Negri's latest Paramount story.

The picture, in brief, concerns the infatuation of Jean Hersholt, a wealthy, middle aged orange grower, with Pola Negri, a waitress. He wooed her by mail, sending a photograph of handsome, young Kenneth Thomson instead of his own, fearful that his grizzled features will fail to charm her.

Miss Negri and Thomson keep Hersholt in ignorance of their marriage but the time comes when they must tell him, as a child is to be born. He is enraged at what

The plot is worked out subtly, with quiet force. The environment is beautiful and romantic, the orange country giving Miss Negri a splendid background. She is lovelier than ever in "The Secret Hour," giving her usual fine performance. Hersholt and Thomson are ideally cast, and much favorable comment is heard on the subject of Rowland V. Lee's able direction.

INCOME TAX FACTS

If the status of a taxpayer changes during the year, his personal exemption is determined by apportionment, in accordance with the number of months the taxpayer was single, married, or the head of a family.

For example, a couple married on July 31, 1927, and living together on December 31, 1927, may file a joint return and claim an exemption of \$3,268.33, that is, seven-twelfths of \$1,500 for the husband while single or \$750, plus seven-twelfths of \$3,500, or \$2,145.83 for the period during which they were married. If separate returns are made, husband and wife may each claim a personal exemption of \$1,684.17. The husband is entitled to seven-twelfths of \$1,500 or \$875 for the period during which he was single and one-half of five-twelfths of \$3,500 or \$729.17 for the period during which he was married. The wife is entitled to a similar exemption.

A person who on July 31, 1927, ceased being the head of a family—the support in one household of a relative or relatives being dependent—is entitled to an exemption of \$2,666.67, which is seven-twelfths of \$3,500, plus five-twelfths of \$1,500.

With respect to the \$400 credit for a dependent, the taxpayer's status as of the last day of the taxable year determines this credit. If during the year his support of such dependent ceased, he is not entitled to this credit.
