Scalloped Macaroni and Fish. Two tablespoons butter, 2 tablespoons flour, 1 1/2 cups milk, 1/2 teaspoon salt, 1 tablespoon minced parsley, 1 tablespoon lemon juice, 1/2 teaspoon pepper, 1 cup flaked cooked fish, 2 cups cooked macaroni, 2 hard cooked eggs, 4 tablespoons grated cheddar cheese.

Melt butter, stir in flour and slowly add milk, stirring constantly. Season with salt, pepper, parsley and lemon juice and bring to the boiling point. Remove from fire and add fish. Put a layer of macaroni into a well buttered baking dish. Add a layer of sauce and slices of hard cooked eggs. Continue layer for layer, until all is used. Cover with buttered crumbs and bake 30 minutes in a moderate oven.



MENUS

BREAKFAST—Shredded fresh pineapple, cereal cooked with raisins, cream, waffles, sirup, milk, coffee.
LUNCHEON—Scalloped macaroni and fish, cabbage and orange salad, fig cookies, milk, tea.
DINNER—Spanish steak, twice baked potatoes, creamed cauliflower and carrots, fruit salad, cheese cups, milk, coffee.

Keep in mind the use of carrots as a vegetable "stretcher." They combine excellently with cauliflower and make it possible to serve the more expensive vegetable proportionately often. If cauliflower is cooked and served in the head, a border of dried carrots adds to the beauty of the dish.

Yesterday the following hand was given:

WEST LEAD: ♠K-Q-3, ♠7-6, ♠10-9-5, ♠A-9-7-3-2, ♠A-7-5-4, ♠A-Q-J-6, ♠J-10-6

EAST LEAD: ♠K-2, ♠A-7-6, ♠A-6-4-2, ♠10-8-7-5, ♠A-J-3, ♠J-4, ♠K-J-7-5, ♠A-Q-J-9

The question was how Declarer, as soon as he saw Dummy's cards, should plan to play the hand, the contract being No Trump.

His scheme of play should be as follows—Winning the first Heart in the Closed Hand and knowing that he is sure of another Heart trick and one Diamond trick, he should scheme his play so as to secure the two remaining tricks needed for game. It would be folly to lead out the Spades, for the chances are that the adverse Spades are not evenly divided; leading them out now probably would only have the effect of making up a Spade for the adversaries. If the fourth Spade can be run now, it can be run later; if it should not be good now (because of four being in one adverse hand), postponing the effort to cash it may produce a discard that makes it successful. In his two hands Declarer has eight Clubs with five in one hand; and seven Diamonds with only four in the long hand; but trying to establish the Clubs with the loss of only one trick might fail. East might have the King-Queen and another Club. If so, and Declarer tried two Club finesses, he would fail to make game by a big margin. The game is assured, however, if Declarer will put Dummy in with a Spade at trick 2 to try a Diamond finesse to trick 3. Even if it lose, Declarer must make at least three Spades, two Hearts, three Diamonds and one Club; and if it win, Declarer will make an additional Diamond and can then try the
