# AT THE THEATERS

Richard Talmadge  
At The  
Colonial Today

Chaplin Comedy  
And Western  
Feature At Star

In "The Better Man," which is having its final showing tonight at the Colonial theater, Richard Talmadge is performing some of the best work of his career. His reputation as a "stunt" actor is increasing steadily, and in this picture he also has plenty of opportunity to exhibit some real acting as well as the story possessing an appealing element of love interest in addition to a wealth of comedy situations and daring feats of skill.
