THE GARDEN

SECRETS OF FLOWER GROWING

Plans for a successful flower garden should begin with the soil. It requires even more careful preparation for the successful growth of flowering plants than does the vegetable garden for vegetables.

The flowering plants, for the most part, are of more delicate type, with smaller root systems, and need more quickly available plant food than the vegetables and also must have a supply of moisture when drought sets in as the shallow root systems soon suffer if moisture is not supplied.

In laying out the garden, do not make the beds so wide that they cannot be weeded easily. The center ought to be reached without going from either side or without it being necessary to step into the bed. Perennials of heavier growth can be planted in much wider beds where the gardener may place stepping stones in order to weed and cultivate in the center.

Four-foot wide beds are excellent for annual planting as they are easily weeded and kept in excellent condition of cultivation by hand.

It is best not to try to grow too many varieties of annuals in a limited space. Long stretches of one variety will give a much finer effect than small colonies of a number of different plants. Five-foot units are about the minimum for good effect. It is also advisable to plant in colonies of one color rather than in colonies of mixed colors as, for instance, a bed of pink asters, a bed of purple asters, or a bed of white asters instead of a

Harrison Ford At Colonial In Rich Comedy

Intimate glimpses into the life of the "tin can tourist" are provided by Alan Hale, director of "Hubber Tires," featuring Harrison Ford and Heesie Love, which will be on view at the Colonial theater, starting today.

This human comedy of the auto camps, which Zelda Sears and Tay Garnett adapted from a story by Frank London, chronicles in a highly humorous vein the motor jaunt of a typical New York family via the auto tourist camps. Miss Love, as Mary Ellen Stack, the heroine, after losing her job in New York City, trades her household belongings for an automobile of ancient vintage, and motors West with her dependent family.

En route she meets the hero, portrayed by Harrison Ford, and the experiences encountered during the trip from the Atlantic to Pacific furnish laughs galore. The family, composed of an indolent Irish father, a veritable lazy boy, the mother portrayed by May Robson, and Mary Ellen's kid brother, never agree on any subject—save that all hope eventually to reach the run-down Stack farm in California, which is about to be sold for delinquent taxes.

"Hubber Tires" was filmed during a trip of several thousand miles, with all of the scenes taken in various auto camps at which the company stopped en route. In addition to Miss Love and Ford the cast includes May Robson, Junior Coghlan, John Patrick and Erwin Connelly.

"Topsy and Eva" At Arcade Tomorrow

The Duncan Sisters, Rosetta and Vivian, make their screen debut in "Topsy and Eva," film version of their own musical comedy stage success, at the Arcade theater Thursday when they open a three-day engagement.
