

Stewart Slips Through Hands Of U. S. Senate

WASHINGTON, Feb. 23 (AP)—For a fleeting moment today the senate got its hands on Robert W. Stewart, chairman of the board of the Standard Oil company of Indiana, but he quickly slipped away into the arms of the courts which once before had taken him from the congressional grasp.

A writ of habeas corpus which the oil man obtained after the senate had arrested him for refusing to answer questions of the Teapot Dome committee was dismissed by

Justice Bailey in the District of Columbia supreme court, and for a moment the waiting senate was great-at-arms ready to take custody of the reluctant witness.

But it was only a theoretical count for Stewart's attorneys immediately noted an appeal and placed a bond of \$5000 for him, and now he has 40 days in which to perfect the appeal and the record in the case for the court of appeals.

The court held the grounds of which the oil magnate refused to testify on the question of the La-berry bonds of the Continental Trading company "were frivolous and without legal basis."

"The writ of habeas corpus will be discharged and the petitioner remanded to the custody of the respondents," he said.

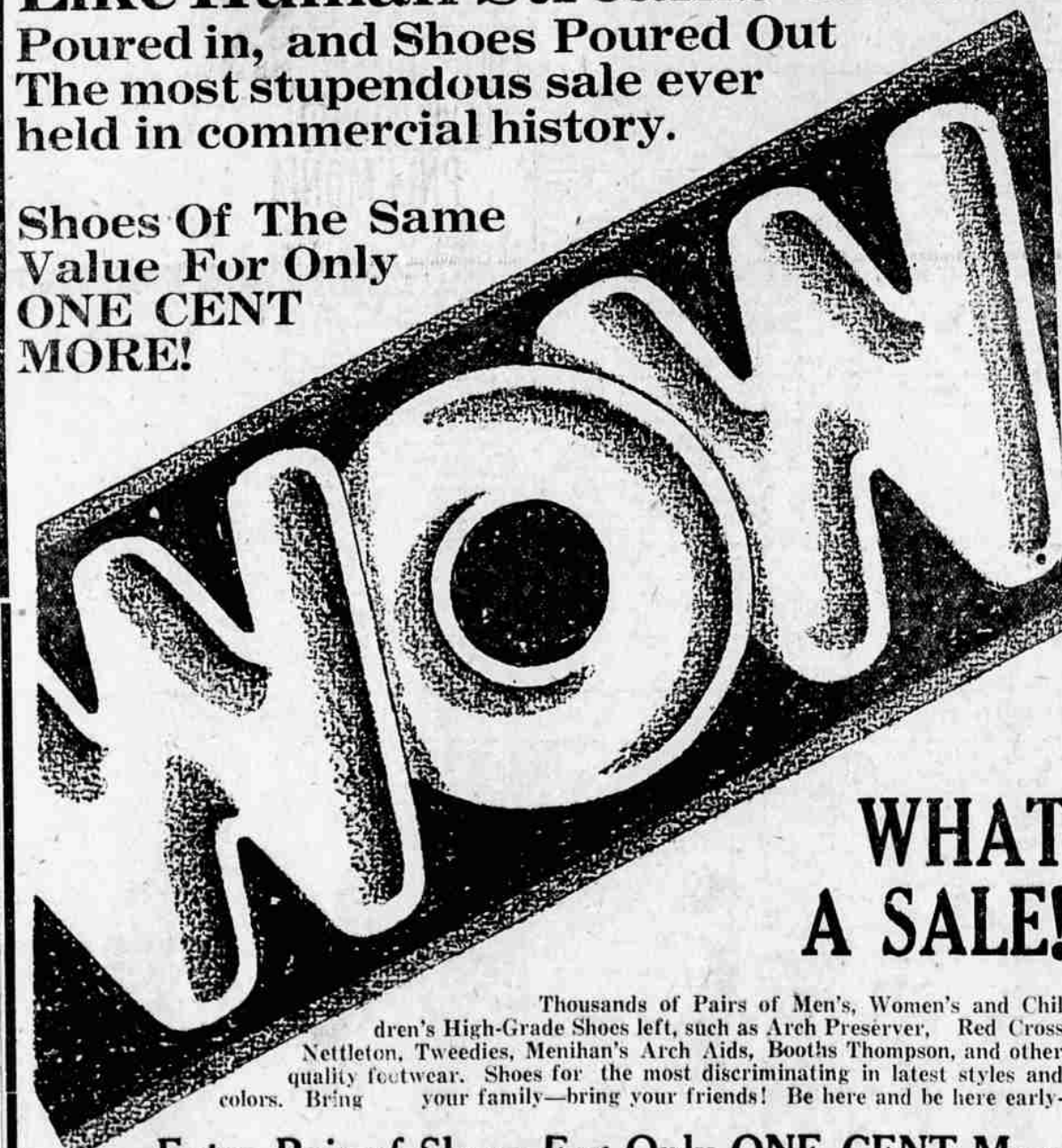
