Trading Brisk After Holiday; Cauliflower Firm

PORTLAND, Ore., Feb. 22 (AP)—Trading was brisk on the local wholesale vegetable markets today following the holiday business of yesterday. Receipts of most commodities were liberal with a somewhat stronger feeling prevailing in many departments.

Butter and eggs were steady with no change in quotations and trading moderate.

Country dressed meats and poultry were also slow, with receipts light and trading dull.

Cauliflower was firmer, most sales of No. 1 California stock bringing around \$1.00 for 12s and larger sizes. Best Homegrown offerings were selling around \$1.25 to \$1.50 per crate. Indications are that cauliflower prices will go higher during the next few days, as continuation of cold nights has retarded maturation of the California valley crop.

Wheat Unsettled, Lower At Close

CHICAGO, Feb. 22 (AP)—Opening 1/4 to 1/2c up, wheat later scored additional gains. Corn started at 1/2c decline to 3/4c, and subsequently underwent a moderate general setback. Oats were firm. Provisions started downward.

Wheat closed unsettled, 1/4 to 1/2c lower; corn 1/4 to 1/2c off; oats at 1/2c decline to 1/2c advance, and provisions showing 1/2c to 1/2c drop.

Trading Irregular In Stock Market

NEW YORK, Feb. 22 (AP)—The rally in stock prices which set in Tuesday was resumed today, but appeared to have lost much of its momentum. Pools succeeded in marking up a number of specialties 3 to 6 points, but renewed weakness of U. S. Rubber and easy offerings of U. S. Steel common on the bulges tended to restrict bullish operations in other sections of the list.

The closing was irregular. Conflicting movements in the high-grade railroads occurred in the final hour. Union Pacific went up 3 1/2 points to 193 1/2, the year's highest, while Atlantic Coast Line slumped 5 1/2 to 170 1/2, a new 1928 low. Fluctuations in the industrials also were pronounced. A sudden gain of 2 points by Sinclair Oil betokened nervousness of the short interest. Total sales approximated 1,700,000 shares.

Shipping Board Averts Boycott By Settlement

AMOI, China, Feb. 22 (AP)—The Edmore incident growing out of the shooting of a Chinese boatman by an American steamship officer, which threatened a boycott of American goods in this port, was settled today.

The Chinese accepted \$5500, Mexican, as indemnity from the United States shipping board. All claims against the shipping board freighter Edmore were dropped and the ship sailed for Hongkong.

On February 9, Chief officer F. R. Willard, of the Edmore attempted to shoot a Chinese alleged to have been stealing flour from the ship and the bullets struck a Chinese boatman who died later.

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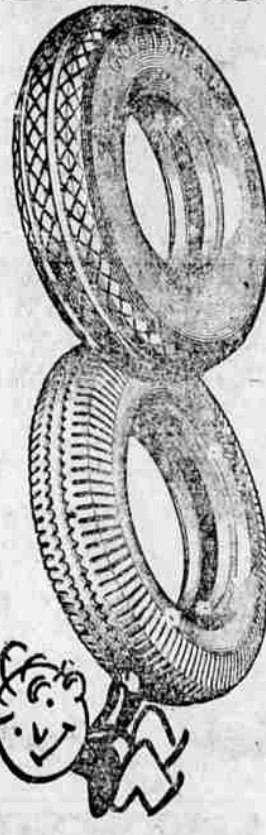
