Sammy Mandell Defeats Fields In Chicago Tilt

CHICAGO, Feb. 24 (AP)—Fighting himself into condition to defend the lightweight championship, Sammy Mandell, has evened the score with Jackie Fields, California junior welterweight, by a decisive victory. Fields won a newspaper decision over Mandell last May in Los Angeles; Mandell turned the tables before a packed Coliseum last night.

For two rounds it seemed that Fields was due to repeat his victory. For Sammy was receiving considerable body punishment. Mandell began to get the range in the third, and his long leaping left soon had one headlight dimmed for the rest of the fight.

The champion's repeated shots of that left optic kept Fields mostly on the defensive and the last half of the battle saw considerable fighting and clinching. There was not a mark on the lightweight. After Fields' early spurt, Mandell took over the pace-setting. Fields tried to turn the tide in the ninth, which wound up in a furious exchange at the bell. Fields clipped the champion twice on the head with rights just as the bell rang and the referee had to tear them apart to end the round.

Mandell tripped once in the seventh and went down, and in the closing round Fields fell in Mandell's corner as he missed the champion with a wild swing.

The crowd filled the Coliseum more than comfortably, with total receipts of approximately \$20,000.

Move on to Throw Out Tournament

CHICAGO, Feb. 24 (AP)—H. O. "Fritz" Crider, former football star of the University of Chicago and now manager of Chicago's annual national inter-scholastic basketball tournament, will leave for Boston tomorrow to defend the tournament against attacks in the meeting of the National Federation of State High School Athletic associations.

Representatives of middle-western state associations have passed resolutions favoring abolition of the tournament and the national meeting will take a vote on the question. Opponents say the tournament takes too much time from school work and that the week of competition is too strenuous for youths of high school age.

Chicago Girls Win Basketball Title

CHICAGO, Feb. 24 (AP)—The right to challenge for the world's basketball championship among girls teams belonged today to the Taylor Trunks of Chicago. They defeated the Cleveland team 18-11 last night in a contest as full of rough play as ten boys could have accomplished.

The Trunks held only a one-point lead until the middle of the last quarter when Cleveland's many personal fouls gave the Trunks plan now to challenge the Edmonton, Alta., commercial grade for a series for the world's title.
