## INCOME TAX FACTS

No. 11  
In determining net income there are allowed certain specified deductions from gross income such as business expenses, interest paid, bad debts, depreciation, rent, contributions, etc.

Deduction from business expenses must have certain qualities to be allowed. They must relate to a business, trade, profession, or vocation in which a taxpayer has invested time and money for the purpose of a livelihood or profit.

A taxpayer may deduct more than one business and claim a deduction for the business expenses of each.

Typical business expenses of a mercantile establishment which are deductible in a return of income are amounts paid for advertising, hire of clerks and other employees, rent, light, heat, water, telephone, insurance, and delivery expenses. The expenses of a manufacturing business include labor, raw materials, supplies, repairs, light and heat, power, selling costs, administration, and other similar charges.

A professional man, such as a lawyer, doctor, architect, dentist, etc., may deduct the cost of supplies used in his practice, expenses paid in the operation and repair of an automobile used in making professional calls, dues to professional societies, subscriptions to professional journals, office rent, cost of light, fuel, water, and telephone used in his office, and the hire of office assistants.

The farmer may deduct all amounts paid in the production, harvesting, and marketing of crops, including labor, cost of seed, and fertilizer used, cost of minor repairs to farm buildings (other than his dwelling), and small tools used up in the course of a year or two.

## Wild Horse To Play In "Wild Beauty"

Rex, the King of Wild Horses, the star of Universal's "Wild Beauty," which shows at the Star theater Saturday only, is not the only wild horse appearing in this massive production.

Besides the wild horses in the leading roles, there is a herd of 1500 ownerless horses who wander the Arizona hill country without molestation from ranchers. This entire herd was rounded up by cowboys and kept penned in a box canyon until they were needed by Director Henry MacRae for scenes in "Wild Beauty."

It took 25 of the Southwest's clearest punchers two days to drive the herd into the canyon. The horses were spotted early one morning wandering in one of the Red Knoll valleys and the cowboys were instantly despatched to their work.

During the first day well over half of the horses were driven into the canyon. During the night many of the other horses entered the canyon of their own volition to join their leader who was one of the first captured and during the next day the remainder of the herd with the exception of a few strays, was trapped also.

When time came for the filming of the "rescue" sequence, June Marlowe, the feminine lead, was placed a hundred yards from the mouth of the canyon and the herd was driven out by the cowboys. Meanwhile cameras were grinding.

The only thing between Miss Marlowe and death was the strong arm of Hugh Allan, the leading lion of the "rescue" sequence, and Miss Marlowe onto the sand dune behind him with the horses thundering not more than 50 feet away. If his horse had tripped or if his grasp on Miss Marlowe had failed a casualty would surely have resulted.

The securing of long-shots of the herd in peaceful repose in the long valley was a comparatively easy task.

## "Flaming Fury" At Colonial Stars Ranger

As a laugh-producer the film will take its place among the best comedies produced in Hollywood for several years. It has an element of pathos every now and then, as some of the "Topsy and Eva" dramatic situations are built up, but invariably these are turned into pure comedy just as they reach the point of making the audience shed tears.

Rosetta and Vivian Duncan have established themselves on the stage as comedienne without superiors; their screen debut will certainly earn them a like honor in the realm of shadowland.

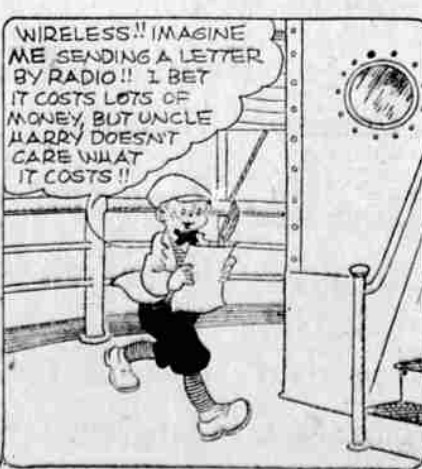

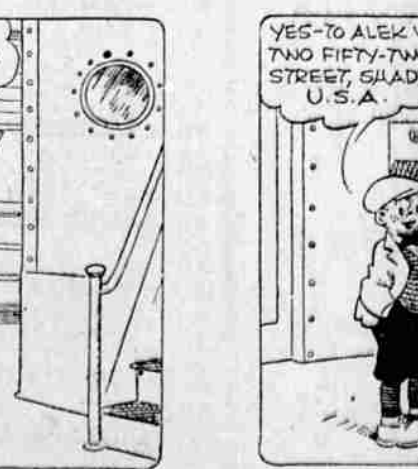
